WOOL STAYS FIRM WITH FEDERAL AID

BOSTON, July 5.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "Dominated by new government orders, the wool market has kept very firm on all descriptions, while medium scoured wools suitable for the government contracts, have shown slight further advances. Worst descriptions are less active but steady."

"Buying in the west is less keen. There has been a fair turnover reported in the south-west, notably in Texas and New Mexico at steady rates mostly between 20 and 25 cents depending upon the wool for fine and fine medium types."

"Foreign markets are firm. "Mohair in modest demand at steady rates."

Shares Reveal Strength

FLOOD OF CANADA WHEAT IS FEARED

CHICAGO, July 5.—(AP)—Apparent virtual abandonment of Canada's policy of withholding from international trade huge amounts of surplus wheat resulted today in smashing wheat values down 5 cents.

A statement from Premier Bennett of Canada that there would be no sacrificing of grain from that country was ignored as a market influence. Attention of traders here focused instead on the fact that the price of wheat at Winnipeg today had tumbled to the minimum permitted by the Canadian government.

Wheat in Chicago, and rye as well closed semi-demoralized, wheat 5-5 1/2 cents down on Wednesday's finish, Sept. 81 1/2, rye 4 1/2-5 cents down, corn 1 1/2-2 1/2 cents down, all provisions unchanged to 2 1/2 cents lower.

FLUCTUATIONS OF BUTTER PRICE END

PORTLAND, July 5.—(AP)—The slight fluctuation in the Portland butter market during the last week has subsided, and dealers found the same prices in effect after the holiday which held July 3, with the exception of standards, which went up one-half cent and prime firsts, which also went up one-half cent.

Egg prices were not changed from the pre-holiday sessions. Cheese prices seem in a fair way to regain ground lost in the slump of last week.

Poultry market has remained quiet but steady, with most of the offerings taken by a consistent demand.

Berries are Lower

Berries, with the exception of raspberries, were down about 19 cents a crate on the wholesale market today. Raspberries continued at \$1.70, while youngberries took a dip from \$1.50 to \$1.25.

Sudden activity in string beans caught some of the producers and jobbers unprepared today. Prices went up slightly, with those from The Dalles assuming importance again in the market. Local beans were not adequate to fill the demand.

Field-grown cucumbers were appearing in local markets in sufficient volume to almost displace the hothouse supply in dealings. The outside vegetables are of fine quality and will be plentiful.
