"NO MORE LADIES" NOW AT ELSINORE

"In Caliente" Coming Soon; Barbara Stanwyck is Star at Capitol

In a story that fairly bubbles with comedy, Joan Crawford and Robert Montgomery come to the Elsinore theatre today in "No More Ladies," the new Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer production directed by Edward H. Griffith.

Prominently featured with the co-stars are Charlie Ruggles, Franchot Tone, Edna May Oliver, Gail Patrick, Reginald Denry and many others. Each sagaciously cast, these polished experts have created a beautiful photoplay from the rich material granted them.

"Brewster's Millions" Has Mirthful and Musical Tone; is at State

Edmund Lowe is off to a new peak of popularity as a result of his performance in "Black Sheep," which continues at the Grand theatre today. He portrays a new character—far removed from any type he has yet done.

STATE FAIR RACES ATTRACT INTEREST

Early summer interest and applications for condition sheets for the horse races to be held at the Oregon state fair, August 31-September 7, indicate that there will be fully as many horses for the meet this year as there were last when upwards of 300 horse owners wired for stall reservations and it finally became necessary to turn them away, Dr. W. H. Lytle, superintendent of racing, announces.

Dr. A. R. Galbraith, Washington racing commissioner, will serve as presiding judge and Harry J. Wood will act as starter, Dr. Lytle announced. Agua Caliente race horse men are among those who are inquiring regarding the fair races which will be held every afternoon beginning Monday, September 2. There will be at least seven races a day, including "foaled in Oregon," non-winners and handicap races.
