A few fire crackers were heard popping now and then as the day wore on, from the hands, no doubt, of stay-at-home children, but the evening revealed no fireworks except an occasional sparkler which seemed to flicker halfheartedly in the darkness.

Time was, they say, when the Fourth of July in Hubbard was an event of importance. When the streets were bright with flags and bunting; when there were patriotic programs and speeches and perhaps a carnival with all its attractions; when every refreshment stand sold pink lemonade and the day wasn't complete without a runaway of frightened horses. But that was long ago, before the day of rodents, automobiles, depressions, super-taxes and other modern amusements.

Anyway, Hubbard was, to all intents and purposes, deserted on the Fourth. Only the flags along the parking on Main street, a gift to the city from the now defunct Women's Relief corps, remained to indicate to passers-by that Hubbard knew it was Independence day.

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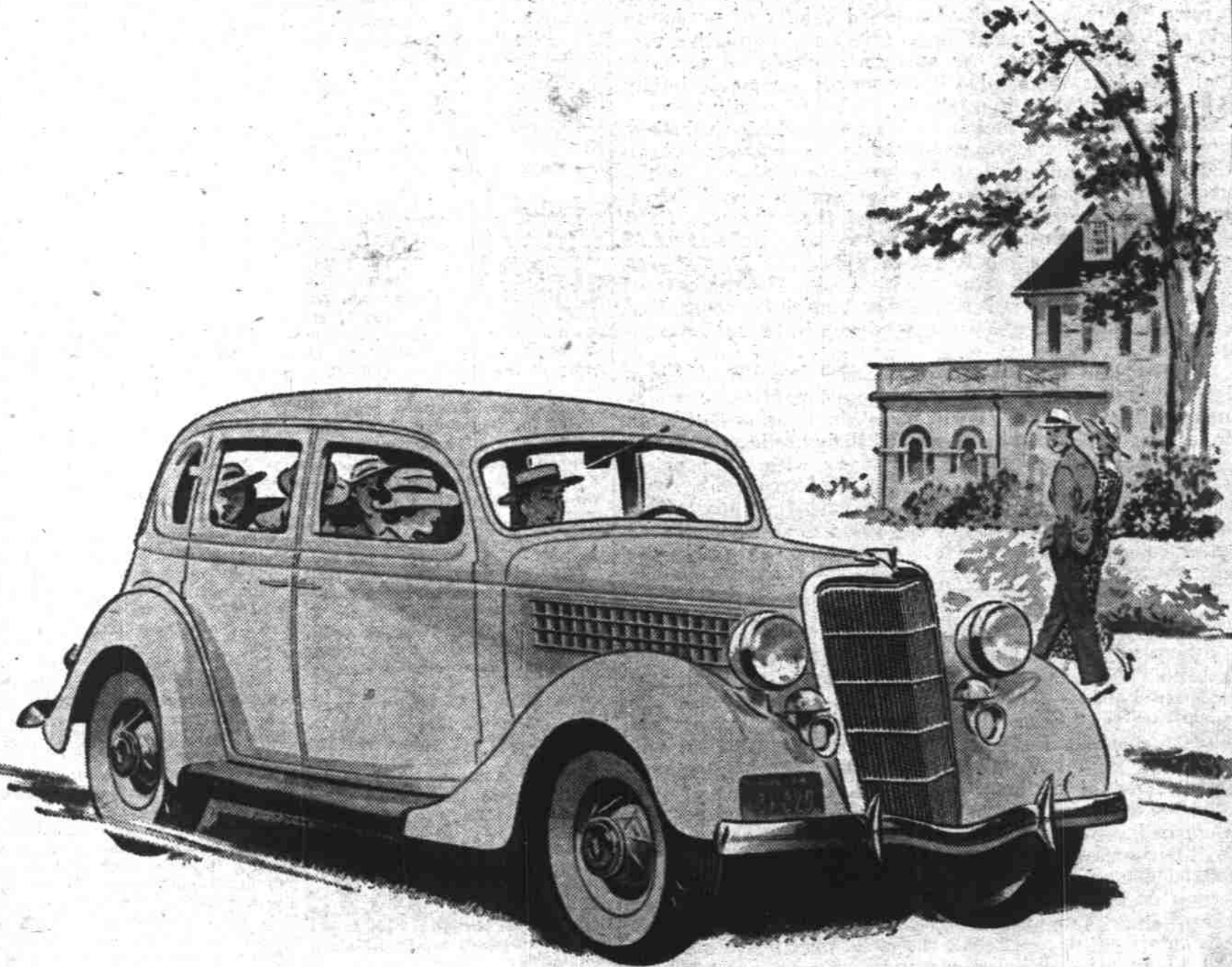
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
