JEFFERSON PARK IS CHEMEKETAN GOAL

Dates of Annual Outing are August 11 to 24; First Visit to That Area

The Chemeketans have selected Jefferson park at the base of Mt. Jefferson for their annual outing, August 11-24. The Eugene Obidians will also camp in Jefferson park this year, in the period August 4-18. Each party will make an ascent of Mt. Jefferson.

This is the seventh outing for the Chemeketans and the first at Jefferson park. In 1929, when the first outing was held, Jefferson park was selected, but snow conditions that season prevented and the location was switched to Marion lake. A climb of the mountain was made from Hunt's cove. Since then the organization has camped at Scott lake on the McKenzie pass, at Indian Henry's, Mt. Rainier; Spirit lake, Mt. St. Helens; Lost lake, Mt. Hood; and Horseshoe lake, Wallawa Mts.

Over Mile High
Jefferson park has an altitude of 5800 ft. It is widely famed as an alpine park. Flowers bloom in profusion in mid-summer.

During the week the two organizations are camped in the park there will be exchange of entertainment at camp fires. Short hikes about the base of the mountain and up to the glaciers will be made. The parties will go in by driving to Breitenbush lake and hiking in over the Skyline trail.

Members of the annual outing committee who are receiving registrations for the outing are Dr. C. A. Downs, Arthur Boesch and C. A. Sprague. The encampment is open to others interested in the great outdoors as well as to members of the Chemeketans.

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SWIM INSTRUCTION TO START MONDAY

All comers can be accommodated at the city swimming pools Monday, opening day of the Red Cross ten-day learn-to-swim campaign, registration last night indicated. Superintendent Vernon Gilmore reported 99 persons had signed for the course at Leslie pool and 91 at Olinger. His staff, he said, is of sufficient size to give adequate instruction to 500 men, women and children.

Both pools will be divided into three depth areas—three-foot, five-foot and deep section—by cross ropes Monday to lighten the safety to swimmers. Gilmore announced. The deep half of the Leslie pool yesterday was given a coat of white paint to improve water visibility; the remainder will be painted late this week.

All Able to Learn
Gilmore pointed out that persons living outside the city limits will be welcomed to the swimming classes during the campaign. He guaranteed that the staff would teach anyone to swim by the end of the ten days.

Monday the classes will be organized; registration will close Tuesday night. The evening hours will be devoted to beginning and advanced adult swimmers.

Water Supply at Silverton Pure

SILVERTON, July 6.—Reports received Saturday morning from samples taken from the new well at Silverton by Dr. C. E. Green of the state board of health, shows the water in an "A" condition; bacteria count, 4; and no gas present. This is the first test made after the well was cleaned out for public use. No chlorine was added to the well water.
