WHAT IS HOME WITHOUT A GARDEN?

My Shirley poppies do not grow well. They are sort of rank and do not blossom very much. I have placed the peat moss used in the poultry houses about them. Do you suppose this has anything to do with it?" asks one of my correspondents.

Shirley poppies want fertilizer but not fertilizer too heavy in nitrogen. That is probably the trouble. Fertilizer from the poultry houses is too heavy in nitrogen. Fertilizer from the cow barns and bonemeal dug into the soil in autumn before the seeds are planted are better medicines. You should also keep all poppies picked as you do sweet peas.

"Tell me how to care for my roses during summer?" is another question coming to me this week.

Summer care of roses is certainly essential to autumn bloom and really autumn bloom is often nicer than that of early summer. No weeds must be allowed to grow. Some sort of mulch is essential. If nothing else than a dust much made by proper cultivation of the soil. Dust mulch should be a couple of inches deep. Peat moss is an exceptionally good mulch. Throughout the hot weather a constant vigilance must be kept for rose diseases. Black-spot particularly makes big headway during the hot dry weather. Dust or spray your foliage every week or ten days.

Fertilization during the summer is important. Liquid manure made from placing a sack of manure from the cow barns in a barrel of water overnight, is advised by many rose growers. But when used this should be well watered down. Commercial fertilizers are also good. Do not get one too heavy in nitrogen. Most of the fertilizers contain nitrogen, potash and phosphates. For summer fertilization I prefer something like a 3-10-10. The three is the nitrogen.

When your rambler roses finish blooming, cut off the canes with the withered blooms. These should be cut right near the ground. Leave three or four good canes of this year's growth. This pruning suggestion is particularly for the Dorothy Perkins varieties. It does not apply to the Austrian copper or the climbing hybrids such as the Lady Hillington.

The liquid manure advised for the roses is also excellent for chrysanthemums. Some of the commercial fertilizers are just as good if more conveniently obtained. Plenty of water and plenty of food are the essentials in chrysanthemum culture. When the buds show color the stop fertilizing. Otherwise they should be fertilized about every ten days.

Pinching out of buds should not be done much after the 15th of July, or blooms will be brought on late.

"What time shall I plant delphinium seeds?" is a third inquiry this week. July is the best month or early in August. If you do not have a cold frame in which to sow the seed, you may use seed boxes

or even sow in the open ground. Your seed bed should be protected and you will have to keep a close watch for insects as delphiniums seem to be particularly choice as insect food. A box with the bottom knocked out makes a good frame around delphinium beds in the open. In preparing the soil for delphiniums, use a layer of three or four inches (if in the open ground) of gravel. Even in your seed boxes put a layer of gravel on the bottom of the box. Your soil mixture should be about one-third garden soil, one-third leaf mould and one-third sand. Sprinkle lime over the top and water. Let the ground settle for eight hours or so before putting in the seed.

A thickness of burlap over the box or bed to keep the bed darkened is important! In using the box frame I suggested, the burlap is held up from the ground. A little stick, higher than the edge of the box, to hold up the burlap a little in one corner will also give necessary air circulation.

BETHANY, July 6.—R. M. Harding, who suffered a paralytic stroke three weeks ago, is reported as improving.

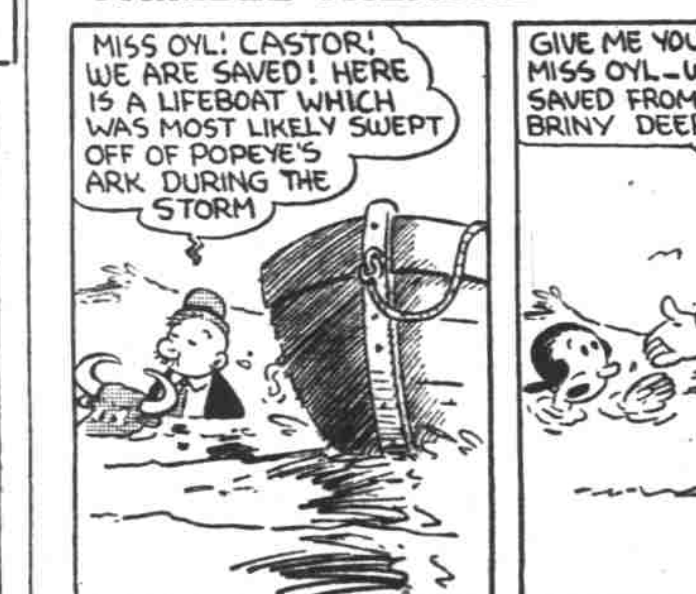

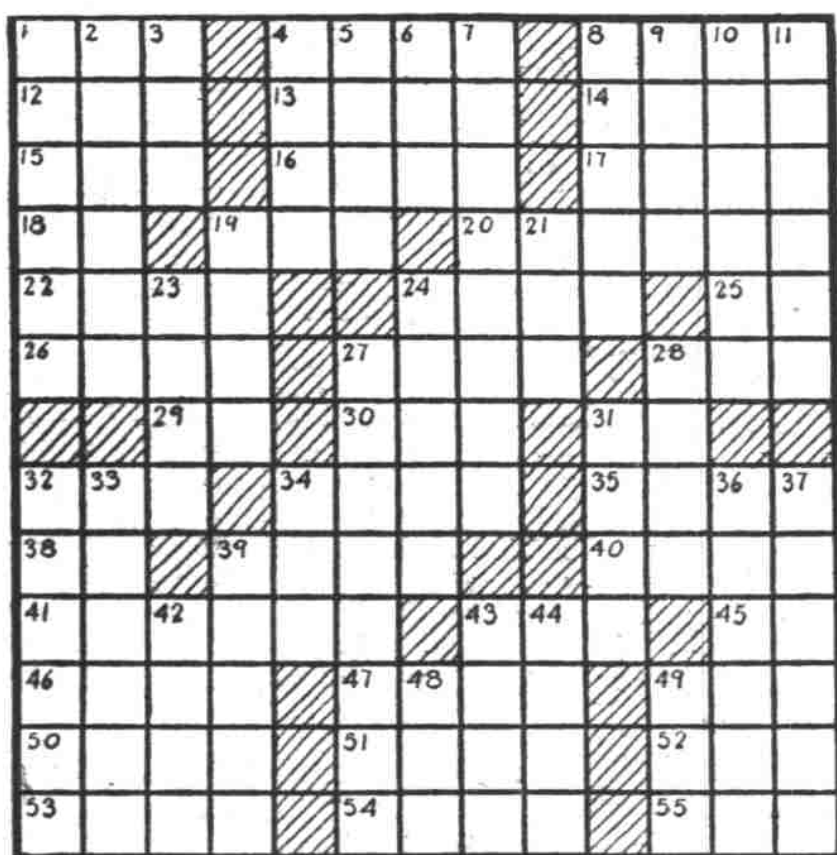
