FEW STOCK GROUPS
TAKEN WITH RISES

NEW YORK, July 8.—(AP)—Stock market traders were ebullient today but some groups were very well taken at rising prices including steel, mail order, farm equipment issues and industrial specialties.

New tops dropped up in many individual issues and the Associated Press average of 60 stocks stalked into new high territory with a life of .5 of a point at 45.5. The previous high was 45.2, made on June 22.

The new peak in the combined average lifted its chief constituent, a net of 2.64 points during the last week. Present holdings amount now to only 615,930 pounds, compared with 782,200 pounds a year ago of 782,200 pounds.

Good demand for top quality eggs for local and shipping requirements has been reported. Jobbing quotations are unchanged, with trading active and arrivals readily absorbed.

General Motors reported total unit sales for June at 131,183 cars and trucks, the best June figure since 1929. In May sales were 134,597 and a year ago 146,851.

A rise of \$1 a ton in lead prices, following similar advance last week, left the shares of the leading producers fractions to 2 points or so higher. The best gains, however, were in specialties and steels, with lifts of 2 to 4 points in such issues as Allied Chemical at 15 1/4, Westinghouse at 15 1/4, International Tobacco "B" at 9 1/4, Acme Steel at 5 1/4, Sloss Sheffield at 23 and Republic Preferred Certificates at 5 1/4.

Advances of major fractions to around 3 points were registered, among others, by U. S. Steel at 36 1/4, Bethlehem at 30 1/4, Bulard Machine at 16 1/4, Auto-Lite at 24 1/4, International Harvester at 48 1/4, Sears Roebuck at 47 and Montgomery Ward at 29 1/4. Transfers totaled 1,309,550 shares.

THRESHER RETURNS
IN WHEAT ARE POOR

CHICAGO, July 8.—(AP)—Increasingly pessimistic reports about black rust northwest and west, together with disappointing thresher returns from domestic wheat areas southwest, had stimulating grain market effects today.

A widely known official crop specialist telegraphing from Aberdeen, S. D., said black rust was heavily prevalent all over that part of the country's spring wheat belt, and has been appearing up to the head of wheat plants. Earlier, he wired that winter wheat in central Nebraska had been damaged 35 to 40 per cent by rust, and that spring wheat in some sections of Iowa had been practically destroyed.

Wheat rose about 2 cents a bushel, and closed firm near the day's top, 1 1/4-1 1/2 above Saturday's closing of 90 1/4-90 3/4. Corn 1/2 off to 1 1/2 up, September 74 1/2-75, oats 1/4-1/2 advanced and provisions showing 7 to 27 cents gain.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 8.—(AP)—Activity on the early gardeners' and ranchers' wholesale market was more brisk last week than it has been for the past month. The volume of sales in almost every line was increased because of the July 4 holidays.

Yakima valley apricots which are of exceptionally fine quality this season have just begun to come into the market. New Yakima apples which held the limelight at the Saturday's early market yesterday morning for \$1.75 per box, are now selling for \$1.75 per box. The supply was small and the demand was limited.
