KHAN EASY FOR SALT LAKE MAN

Asiatic Visitor Can't Do Much When Strategist Gets Hold on Him

Abdul Khan may be tops among the wrestling great in the purple hills beyond the Khyber Pass, but the bearded Afghan was just another chump to Del Kunkle, clever Salt Lake City wrestler, in an abbreviated match before a large armory crowd last night. The main event with its international color produced few fireworks as the husky, well-tanned Kunkle, one of the west's greatest strategists, found little to worry him in the frantic assaults of the disgruntled Abdul.

The pride of the Salt Lake limb twisting cult waited his antagonist out for seven minutes before pinning the squirming little man from the eastern steppes of Asia with a combination leg split and toe hold. Khan, his mustache bristling with indignation, came back to the wars to spill the indifferent Kunkle in three minutes with a series of headlocks that delighted ringersiders with their crashing gusto. A swiftly applied body slam ended the episode. Kunkle, fully aroused to action again, gained the deciding palm in 30 seconds of wild maneuvering. A solid somersault culminating in a body press ended the tepid fray, as the Abdul rushed about the ring straightening his rumpled beard and loudly protesting to Referee Harry Eliot.

Borrowing Indian Tricks
Rob Roy borrowed a wrestling trick from the Iroquois of his native Michigan forests, when he worked Ray Lamplier, 179, Sacramento, into a pair of "Indian deathlocks." Both savage holds, as ancient as the limb twisting game, brought copious tears to the dismayed Californian's eyes, as he screamed out his surrender. Lamplier dominated the second melee, inveigling Roy into a painful Boston crab. The battlers opened the fray with a wild rain of fisticuffs that recalled the palmy days of Jack Dempsey, as they made the late Baer-Bradock title go resemble pale lemonade. During the heavy going Roy absorbed ample rabbit punches to stop the combined Ethiopian and Italian armies, but he had enough left to repeatedly pick himself off the floor boards and to bore in for the victory. The bout, scheduled for 45 minutes, lasted half that time.

Salmon used in salads and sandwich spreads is a boon to the picnic lunch basket as it is quick to prepare and keeps well. Any salmon recipe, however, is welcome at the Round Table this week. The contest ends at noon Thursday.

Following are more summer beverages:

Hawaiian Punch
1 can crushed pineapple
4 lemons (juice)
2 quarts cold tea
1 cup maraschino cherries (juice and chopped)
1 cup sugar or more if desired
Mix pineapple, lemon juice, tea and cherries in a punch bowl with a large piece of ice. Add sugar and serve cold. Makes about 14 glasses.

Summer Juice
1 pint raspberry juice
4 lemons (juice)
1 quart plain or carbonated water
1/2 cup sugar or to taste
Combine raspberry and lemon juice and sweeten to taste. Just before serving add water and serve in glasses with plenty of ice and sprig of mint at top. Serves eight.

Pineapple Juice Eggnog
4 eggs
4 tablespoons sugar
1 No. 2 can pineapple juice
1/2 cup of nutmeg
1 cup crushed ice
Separate eggs. Beat yolks until thick and lemon colored. Add sugar and nutmeg and beat again. Add pineapple juice and ice. Fold in beaten egg whites. Shake well. Serves four.

Chocolate Egg Shake
1 egg
1 cup cold chocolate beverage
1 tablespoon whipped cream
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
Beat egg thoroughly and add cold chocolate. Fold in whipped cream and vanilla and serve at once.

Iced Chocolate
2 or 3 tablespoons chocolate
1/2 cup 2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 cup milk
1 quart milk
Stir water into chocolate and sugar; boil 1 or two minutes, and add either directly to the scalded milk or add cold milk to chocolate.

Chocolate Egg Shake
1 egg
1 cup cold chocolate beverage
1 tablespoon whipped cream
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
Beat egg thoroughly and add cold chocolate. Fold in whipped cream and vanilla and serve at once.

Indigent Law Frees 2 From County's Jail

SILVERTON, July 9.—A 1935 law was used in Silverton on Tuesday for the first time in Marion county. The new statute provides that indigent persons committed for non-payment of fines should prove they have less than \$20 and who have served 30 days in the county jail can petition the court for discharge. If after investigation, their petition proves correct, it becomes mandatory for the judge to discharge them and satisfy their fine.

Ordie Oldham and Roy Brown, who were committed April 26 for dynamiting fish took advantage of the law and upon petition were dismissed. A \$250 fine had been placed on each one.

Oldham and Brown have been in the county jail here since they were sentenced. Early this week appeal was made to the county court to provide funds for their families to live upon pending the return of the men to their homes. They have been serving out their fines at the rate of two dollars a day.

Tax Turnovers in County Large for Recent Period

Tax turnovers to the county treasurer's office have aggregated \$103,116 within the last three days, D. G. Drager, treasurer, announced last night. Largest of the turnovers was \$46,181 for 1935 taxes. This was the seventh time this year the sheriff's office has received money for this year's taxes to the treasurer.

The treasury received \$11,803 on taxes for 1931, the 26th turnover of collections from that tax roll.

Reconstruction Sought in Harmony With State, Federal Program

Resolutions endorsing proposed remodeling of the Marion county courthouse and urging that such reconstruction be done to provide a building in harmony with the proposed new federal and state buildings, were approved by the Salem Lions club board of directors, meeting this week at the home of Secretary Ralph Kietzing. The resolution will be presented for the club's action at the meeting Thursday, when installation of new officers will be the feature.

The directors also approved, subject to cooperation with the Rotary and Kiwanis clubs, sponsoring a breakfast August 4 for about 70 students who will be here in attendance at the second America-Japan student conference.

Endorsement of the Salem police first aid car project was given, to be passed on to the entire membership for final approval.

Consideration was given the the District Lions clubs' project of landscaping the state blind school grounds. Salem Lions have donated \$50 to the project, Portland Lions have set aside \$50, and the other \$250 will be raised from the 51 Lions clubs in the district. The directors voted to continue regular meetings during the summer, except for a brief recess the last two weeks in August. A picnic will replace one of the late July meetings.

Barclay A. Newman is retiring president of the Lions, with Kenneth Brandon to be installed president Thursday noon.

Colored Clowns Meet Senators This Afternoon

The Broadway Colored Clowns, touring negro baseball club that mixes comedy with fast baseball, will meet the Salem Senators on Olinger field at 5:30 o'clock this afternoon. The Clowns, who have been on the circuit since early spring, are one of the best of the numerous traveling teams. Several outstanding negro players are listed on the roster of the colored nine.

The Senators are even-up now in their clashes with road teams, having won from the Amish Argentine club and lost Monday to the House of David. The Senators turned in one of their best games against the House of David but lost 2 to 0.

Death in Wake of Farmers' Duel on Boundary Fences

FREERPORT, Ill., July 9.—(AP)—A feud between two aged farmers over straying hogs resulted today in the death of one and the critical wounding of his adversary after a pistol duel at approximately 10 yards.

Frank Williams, 68, was dead and his neighbor, John Linton, 70, was in a Freepoint hospital, where physicians said his life was ebbing.

They occupied adjoining farms near Shannon—with their farm homes only a few rods apart—and it was over a low fence separating their property that the duel was fought, authorities said.

Drunken Driving Charge, Williams

Joe O. Williams, 493 Center street, was jailed by Salem police last night on a charge of driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor. He was arrested in north Salem. No accident was connected with the case, police said.

Among speakers on the value of health association were Dr. A. B. Starbuck, Dallas; Miss Laura Taylor of the Normal school; Josiah Willis, county school superintendent; Dr. George C. Knott, Independence, and Mrs. Saldie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis association. Mrs. Dunbar gave some highlights of the recent national meeting at Saranac Lake, New York, and presented health statistics on conditions in Polk county.

500-Mile Trip to Study Geology of State Attractive

CORVALLIS, Ore., July 9.—(AP)—Wide interest in the 500-mile public geology field trip through central Oregon this week was reported today by Dean E. L. Packard, dean of the school of science, who with Dr. W. D. Wilkinson, also of Oregon State college, will lead the tour.

Koo Says Little Chance China to Go Communistic

PORTLAND, Ore., July 9.—(AP)—There is little danger of China going communistic, Dr. T. Z. Koo, former prominent Chinese official declared today.

But should the country go "red," he asserted, it would be only as a last desperate effort to avoid "alien rule."

Dr. Koo, vice-chairman of the World Student Christian Federation with headquarters in Peiping, China, was principal speaker here today at the Pacific northwest institute of international relations.

JOHNSON LAUDS RYAN

Johnson's statement had particular significance in view of the developing fight between Ryan, conservative candidate for re-election, and a Pacific coast radical delegation headed by Harry Bridges.

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
