JORTLAND, July 29 .- (AP)-Increased consumption or better has brought a better demand and the market is getting well settled. It is believed the government will soon begin buying some butter in the east for further stabilization of prices. Trading has been active, and buyers are filling ship-

The Oregon butter committee sent out notice today of an amendment to the state butter code, to be effective July 10, showing the minimum a butterfat price schedule of the Oregon butter code (schedule A) has been changed for the purpose of remedying certain inequalities and adjusting discrepancies which exist in the present schedule. It provides for a manufacturing margin which is never less than four
