Men's Convention to Start Here Saturday; Picnic Sunday, Silverton

A number of local people will take part in the work and programs of the Lutheran gatherings to be held in the American Lutheran church here July 13 and at the Silverton park July 14. The young men's quartet of the American Lutheran church will sing "I Love a Lassie" and "Dare is Dying in the West" at the banquet Saturday night. This quartet will also sing "Beautiful Savior" and the Brotherhood hymn at the afternoon program in Silverton park. The quartet consists of Thomas Allport, Junior M. Nelson, Virgil Nelson and Cecil Quesseth. Miss Hoshi Watanabe is the accompanist. Miss Louigne Brietzke will sing "Give Me Thine Heart" at the worship hour in Silverton park Sunday morning. C. B. Glover, director of the American Lutheran choir, will sing the "Stewardship Song" on the same occasion.

Mayor V. E. Kuhn will address the convention Saturday afternoon and tell the visitors about the city of Salem and its special points of interest. W. C. Krueger will have charge of the sightseeing tour to show out-of-town visitors the city and surrounding territory. Max Gehlhar, former director of agriculture for Oregon, will deliver the main address Sunday afternoon. He is chairman of the standing committee on resolutions. Theodore G. Nelson is chairman of the committee on permanent organization. A. A. Krueger, G. A. Anderson and George Quesseth are serving with John Gopher, Amos Cochran and Elmer Johnson of Silverton as the convention's hospitality committee. Oscar Sedarstrom is chairman of the banquet committee. The Ladies' guild of the American Lutheran church will serve the banquet under direction of Mrs. A. B. Thompson and Mrs. E. J. Stewart.

Rumor Grows Anent Recall Move, Martin

With Monday, July 15, the beginning of open season for recall of Governor Martin, rumors persisted at the statehouse yesterday that a preliminary petition would be filed asking a special election on the proposed recall but no individual or group showed up to inform the secretary of state's office that a recall would be started.

To secure a special election, 51,157 voters would be required to sign the recall petitions. Never in the state's history have that number of signers been secured on any ballot measure, either recall, initiative or referendum. In 1922, 43,000 signers were secured asking for the recall of Fred A. Williams, then a public utilities commissioner, while a smaller number of signers were secured for a petition asking for the recall of Fred Buchtel, also a commissioner, who had been named from the first congressional district.

CITY WATER BONDS READY, SIGNATURE

Eleven hundred neatly printed bonds, each for \$1000, were lying on the desk of City Recorder Jones yesterday ready for the official signatures which will start them into the hands of purchasers throughout the United States. The issue will provide Salem with \$1,100,000, with which the purchase of the Oregon-Washington Water Service company's plant will be completed.

The bonds will probably be delivered this weekend unless Mayor V. E. Kuhn or Mr. Jones have written a check. They were sold at the most favorable price at which Salem ever marketed a bond issue with the exception of a minor issue put out last week. The average interest charge on the bonds will be 3.20 per cent.

City Stamps Vended Over Face Values

City Recorder Warren Jones believes in making money for the city and George D. Cabot, Meadville, Pa., believes in paying a good price for stamps, so together they enhanced the city's treasury by \$3 yesterday.

Jones has on hand 8000 left-over bear-tax stamps which lost their value locally when the legislature took away the power of cities to tax bear.

The council authorized Jones to sell the stamps on the best terms possible, expecting him to get a few dimes or dollars for the entire collection.

CAPITOL FINANCING SCHEME CONSIDERED

that he was assured FWA would earmark Oregon's funds for a new capitol and hold the money indefinitely provided Secretary Ickes had positive assurance from the board that the new statehouse project was going to be pushed through.

Budget Director Hood sat in at the conference and told the board members that he was impressed by the pay-as-you-go proposal of the state treasurer. He said he thought any bonds offered should not be for a longer period than ten years with optional retirement after two years. He predicted the bonds could be sold at not to exceed two and one-half per cent interest.

Hood told the board that plans for a new capitol should include space for a number of offices now located in Portland. He said he was certain expenditures for the biennium would not exceed but would probably run under the appropriations made by the 1935 legislature.

Governor Martin said the special committee working with the

Willamette university trustees was not yet ready to report on the acquisition of the campus for additional ground for the capitol.

FINAL EFFORT TO AVERT WAR LOOMS

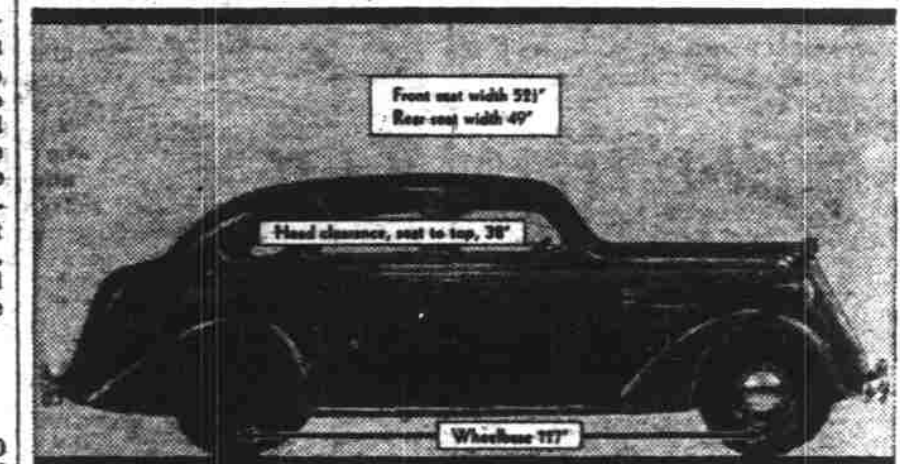
