

TRINDLE WILL NOT START SUIT

District Attorney Says Legislature Sole Judge of Governor's Eligibility

Mr. Trindle said yesterday that he had given the matter all the study the limited time allotted to him permitted. He said he was not unmindful of a brief handed him by one of the most able attorneys in the state to the effect that the governor was not eligible to hold office because he was a retired officer of the United States army.

Asked if the legislature could reconsider the question of Governor Martin's eligibility after it had seated him as governor last January, Trindle said he believed it had that right. With a predominance of democrats in the house, however, such action is very unlikely.

Trindle made his decision not to press the case after examining a number of cases in other states where eligibility of state executive officers had been questioned. He came to the conclusion that framers of many constitutions, including those who made the Oregon constitution, had entrusted the sole determination of the eligibility of the chief executive officer of the state to the legislature and had taken that power away from the supreme court.

He cited a number of cases including a Michigan action: *Dingman v. Board of Censors*. In this case the court held that "the framers of the constitution made provision for contests for the more important offices before the legislature and before the legislature alone. This provision excludes the courts from jurisdiction so far as contests for these offices are concerned. It was designed to discourage and prevent long drawn out and needless litigation and content between private parties over the higher and more important offices of the state. The determination of the legislature is a finality, and private parties, ambitious to hold these offices, or litigious in character, cannot compel action by the legislature or go elsewhere and secure delay in carrying out the recorded will of the electorate."

Agreement Near At Forest Grove In Lumber Mills

FOREST GROVE, Ore., July 11.—(P)—The 135 members of the Sawmill and Timber Workers' union local here were represented today as in agreement with two operators on terms to end their strike, but holding out until a third operator guarantees against any future discrimination against strikers.

The union was said to be in complete agreement with the Cannacher and Interstate Logging companies, and in agreement with the Coasolidated Lumber company on all phases except a "no discrimination" guarantee. Unofficially it was reported the workers had voted favorably on agreements for a 40-hour week, a minimum wage of 50 cents an hour, and a five cents an hour raise for all returning workmen.

vinced said 2,000 to 3,000 persons perished in floods there.

C. L. Sharp, of Fort Worth, Texas, air mail pilot arriving here from Shanghai, reported the flooded Yangtze was roaring through two new gaps in the dike 200 miles east of Hankow and inundating extensive low-lying farm lands.

Reports from Honan said the Lo river rose 20 feet after torrential rains, littering the landscape with human bodies and wrecking the once prosperous town of Yanchai Hsien, 20 miles east of Honan.

In Hopeh province the swollen Han river spread out still further and the important city of Laohokow was reported virtually submerged. Ten thousand persons there were said to be homeless, with 3,000 houses destroyed.

Miner Survives Burial in Slide

GRANTS PASS, Ore., July 11.—(P)—The frightful experience of being buried alive under a slide while placer mining with his brother, Ari, near Yreka, Cal., was related today by Delmar Adkins on his return to the Jerome Prairie district near here.

They were mining for gold, and an avalanche buried Delmar, leaving only a tuft of hair showing. His brother extricated him. He received only a broken leg.

Cloudburst Rips Out Rail Tracks

CANYON CITY, Colo., July 11.—(P)—A cloudburst 25 miles west of here late today sent heavy waters roaring down the Arkansas river, ripping out several sections of the Denver & Rio Grande Western railway tracks.

At Echo two rail bridges and 500 feet of track were reported swept away. Railway employees said flood waters swept over the tracks to a depth of four feet at Echo.

DEFICIT DECREASES AS TAX LEVIES FALL

State Tax Levies for Current Year Less Than Half Those for 1929

Real property taxes for state purposes have declined steadily in Oregon the last seven years and the inclusion of the cost of a new capitol in the budget for 1935, 1937 and 1938, would not increase these taxes, a survey of state finances here yesterday showed.

Whereas in 1929 property owners in the state paid a total of \$5,648,582 in state taxes, this year the total will be only \$2,667,996. Both these figures include the levies, outside the six per cent limitation, made for higher education's support and a \$500,000 annual contribution by the state to the veterans' bonus commission.

While tax levies for state purposes have been declining, the deficit in the state general fund has also been lessened. At the end of 1928 this deficit was \$2,196,837. The item climbed to \$4,529,595 at the end of 1933, was cut down to \$1,304,290 the end of last year and would be eliminated entirely this year were it not for \$2,000,000 appropriated by the last session of the legislature for old-age pensions and for the relief of unemployed persons in the 36 counties of the state.

ASKS HOUSE MEMBE TO TELL ON LOBBIES

WASHINGTON, July 11.—(P)—The entire house membership was invited tonight to help investigate lobbying for and against utility holding company abolition.

While the senate ordered a thorough-going inquiry into lobbying on any and all questions, Chairman O'Connor (D-N.Y.) of the house rules committee addressed to every representative an appeal for the names of all individuals who sought to sway their votes.

Meanwhile, the committee came to a tentative pause in its investigation of alleged misuses of administration influence applied in an effort to swing the vote of Representative Brewster (R-Me.). The results were wrapped in a mass of conflicting statements.

In approving the lobby investigation, proposed by Senator Black (D-Ala.), the senate gave it a \$50,000 fund to meet expenses and empowered it to draw upon the justice department's staff of "G-men" and obtain clerical assistance from executive departments as well.
