Depositors Get


Full Repayment

Every depositor in the Chiloquin state bank, in liquidation since February, 1932, was fully paid yesterday when A. A. Schramm, state bank superinten-

dent, placed checks in the mail completing 100 per cent repayment of commercial department claims. Savings department claims were paid in full last fall. Secured claims of \$29,000 and preferred claims of \$3415 had been paid in advance of payments to the other creditors.

The department earned \$5000 above liquidation costs from interest on the banks assets during the liquidation. Remaining assets go to the bank's stockholders.


