APRICOTS COME TO TWO LOCAL PLANTS

Paulus Brothers Will Can Them, Reid Murdoch to Use in Preserves

Apricots will be handled by Reid Murdoch and company and Paulus Brothers cannery here again this season, with Paulus cannery to place its block of cots coming from The Dalles in the cans, and Reid Murdoch to use the cots in preserves, using none in the cans this year, though this cannery handled a pack last year. The apricots are shipped in here with about 50 per cent ready for the can at time of arrival. The Murdoch block of cots will come from Yakima, reaching here in 10 days to two weeks.

Operations at the Reid Murdoch plant are still being carried on with two shifts, but the number of employees has been cut to 150 since the cherry season ended. After Wednesday, only a night shift working on berries, will be on. Logans and black raspberries are about through, though red raspberries, for both jam and canning, and youngberries are still coming strong. This plant is handling several thousand cases of youngberries this season.

Pitting Cherries
Reid Murdoch will start this morning to pitting brine cherries for maraschino stock, a small crew of women being employed on this work. Red sour cherries are being put in preserves at this plant now, and other canneries are also handling these cherries.

Price on the red sour cherries this year is the lowest on all fruits, at 2 cents to the grower. This is due to big crops in both Michigan and New York, which at 1 1/2 cents to the grower in those states gives western packers only the coast trade.

REGISTRY OF BEES COMPLIANCE SHORT

Only About Half of Owners Sign Up, Inspector in This County Says

Only about a 50 per cent compliance with the state law which requires beekeepers to register their hives is reported to date by Joe Marty, one of the inspectors in this county, who was in town yesterday from the Silver Creek Falls section.

The law, passed by the 1933 legislature to provide for prevention and spread of bee diseases, provides for a registration fee of 50 cents for the first 10 hives and an additional 5 cents for each hive in excess of the first 10, with maximum registration fee \$15.

A recent statement from the department of agriculture, division of plant industry, says further:

"The penalty provided by law for violations of any provisions of the act and for failure to register bees or for false statement in regard to the number of hives in an apiary is a fine of not to exceed \$25."

"This law was framed for the benefit of the bee men themselves, and in order to make it effective a full cooperation must be freely given. Registration fees are the only source of income for carrying on this important work."
