Supervised Recreation Projects Are Opened For Youths About Woodburn

WOODBURN, July 18.—Three new SERA recreational projects for this vicinity got under way Tuesday. All work being done on these projects is supervised by people on relief rolls. The work is being done under the supervision of a committee of local men appointed by C. A. Howard, superintendent of public instruction. Committee members and the activities of which they have charge are: B. W. Dunn, chairman; Dr. Gerald B. Smith, swimming; C. R. Duncan, community band; H. M. Austin, baseball; L. C. Buchner, playground. While B. W. Dunn is at Corvallis taking summer school work, C. R. Duncan is acting as chairman of the committee.

A playground program has been started. Five days a week there will be supervised playground work carried on at the Lincoln grade school grounds. Mrs. Joe Uphoff will have charge. There will be hiking, games, story telling, tours of Woodburn industries, and other features that will interest children. Any child is eligible to attend. The playground program will be carried out five days a week. The old swimming

hole on Pudding river, just south of the bridge on the Woodburn-Mount Angel road, is being put into condition for safe supervised swimming. Omer Hastie will be caretaker. Royal Hastie will be swimming instructor. He will supervise swimming five days a week, from Tuesday to Saturday. He has had experience and training in such work at Oregon State college, and with the Red Cross.

Instruction for all boys interested in baseball will be given three days a week at the Legion baseball park, with Peter DeGuire coaching the youngsters. Teams will be organized, and there will be intra-school play.

Another SERA project is the Woodburn community band, which is under the direction of Kenneth Asbury. The band rehearses at the city hall each Monday night. Membership of the group is growing steadily. The band at its last practice made tentative plans for an all-day picnic. It is hoped that the band will be able to give a concert or two in the latter part of the summer.

These SERA projects will last to about September 14, or when school begins.
