

LEGION AND LODGE PICNICS ON SUNDAY

Both Groups Meet at Hazel Green Park, With Duties Stated

SILVERTON, July 18 — Because there was a conflict in their picnic dates the American Legion officials and those of the Artisans met Wednesday night at Silverton and compromised for the Sunday picnic which both had planned to have at Hazel Green park Sunday, July 21. The local Legionnaires had been of the understanding that the park would be theirs for the day and the Artisans seemingly had somewhat the same idea. A satisfactory compromise was made and both will picnic there the same day.

Some changes will be made in the program, however. Charges of admission will be changed from 25 cents set by the Legion, to 10 cents. The dance the Legionnaires are giving, planned free if they held exclusive rights to the grounds, will now be charged at the rate of ten cents. The Artisans have been assured of a refund of 5 cents on the admission charge from their group after they have entered the grounds for the day.

Artisans Ball Game
The Artisans are to put on the ball game with the Legionnaires as guests. The Legion is to sponsor all other sports as was originally scheduled and will have their stands for refreshments also as planned. The dance will be given by the Legion with Ed Lais' orchestra furnishing the music. Frank M. Powell, C. E. Hixson, both of the Artisans, are membership committee in charge of the sports program and are announcing a detailed schedule for the afternoon.

Cash prizes are being offered for first and second place. Special emphasis is being put on the soft ball contest between Salem and Silverton Artisans. The basketball lunch hour for the Artisans is slated for 1 o'clock.

CHURCHES COUNCIL LEADERS SELECTED

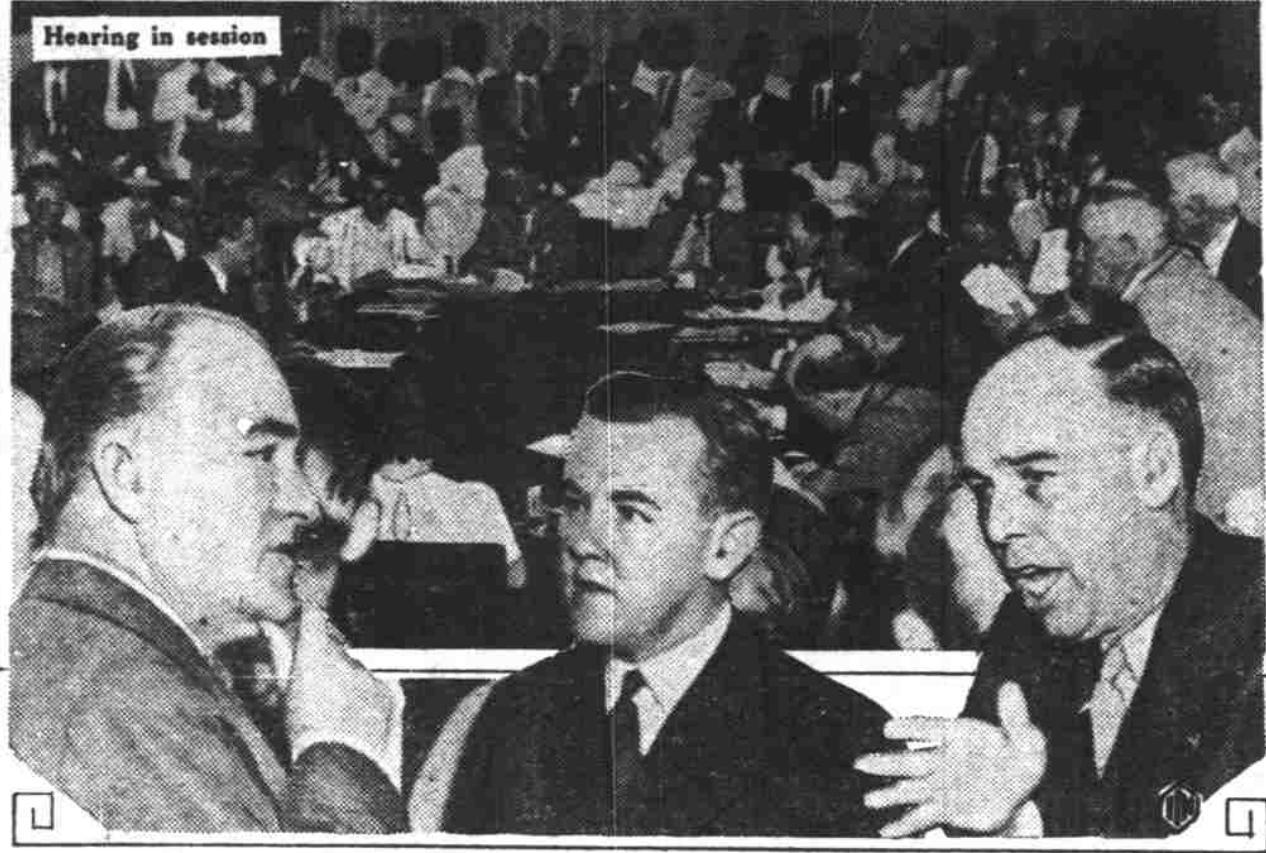
Alice Mountain is Home Again Though Cast is Necessary

WOODBURN, July 18.—The season's run of loganberries, red and black raspberries, youngberries, and pie cherries is virtually completed at the Ray-Maling cannery here. The cannery this summer has not put up so large a pack of berries as it has in former years, despite the fact that the holdover of canned berries is very small. The canning of Royal Anne and black cherries

was completed about a week ago. The cannery is making plans to put up apricots, pack on this fruit to begin the latter part of the week. Preparations are being made for the pear pack, also. Ten pear peeling machines arrived at the plant early in the week.

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BRADSHAW FUNERAL AWAITS RELATIVES

MILL CITY, July 18.—Solomon Bradshaw, 84, one of the oldest residents and who committed suicide here Tuesday evening following many months of ill health, was born in Cincinnati, Ohio, October 26, 1850. When quite young he moved to Missouri where he married Alice Horrom December 9, 1875. They celebrated the 59th anniversary of their wedding at their home last December.

In 1877 Mr. and Mrs. Bradshaw came to Oregon and located on a farm a few miles from the present site of Mill City where they lived until 1929 when they bought a home in Mill City. At the time they came here there was no town where Mill City now stands and very few were the residents. Mail was brought in once a week horseback to the old Gardner home in Fox valley. Mr.

Bradshaw was a life-long member of the Christian church. While in poor health for many years, a year ago he had a severe attack of pneumonia and since has been in very feeble health and at times suffered greatly.

Surviving are the aged widow, two sons, John of Mill City and Archie of Portland, and two daughters, Mrs. Nora Booth of Ontario, Calif., and Mrs. Emma Alexander of San Francisco, and seven grandchildren. Funeral services will be held Friday at 3 p. m. from the Christian church, Rev. Raiston officiating.
