

OFFICERS BOYS' SCHOOL FETED

Laughlin Says Month Cost \$2 at Training Center; Hood Speaks

WOODBURN, July 18. — The second annual dinner for the staff of officers at the Oregon state training school for boys was held Wednesday night in the auditorium of the school, with about 60 officers, state officials, and friends of the school in attendance.

Superintendent Sam Laughlin acted as toastmaster and also gave some of the highlights of the past year's work at the school. He pointed out that virtually all of the food served at the dinner—including the chicken, many vegetables, and berry pie—were products of the school's gardens. Laughlin said that the present cost per inmate per month is approximately \$2. He visions a time when all food products eaten by the inmates will be grown on the farm.

Urges No Politics
Last minute conflicts prevented the attendance of members of the board of control, all of whom had indicated they were to come. Governor Martin sent a representative, D. C. Hood, director of the state budget. Hood was high in his praise of the school's work, and like Laughlin, expressed the desire that the administration of the training school be taken more out of the hands of politicians and placed in charge of persons qualified to handle cases of delinquency and institutions for rehabilitation.

Walter G. Gleason, recently appointed on a state board to investigate juvenile delinquency, spoke briefly. His theme was that boys and girls should be regenerated through love rather than force.

Representing Earl Snell, secretary of state, Dr. P. O. Riley spoke in his usual eloquent manner, stressing the point that one should first of all to himself be true. Rev. Father Rubis of the St. Luke's Catholic church of Woodburn, dwelt upon the sacredness of marriage, and indicated that much juvenile delinquency is caused by broken homes.

A program of orchestral and vocal music was directed by Mrs. John T. Myers. Mrs. Myers sang, "Ah, Sweet Mystery of Life."

An eight-piece orchestra, directed by Dr. A. F. deLapins, played band and concert selections. The dinner was served by a competent corps of boys trained by the hostess, Mrs. Laughlin.

Other special guests were: Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Lindbeck, Mrs. P. O. Riley, Mrs. Gleason and members of the orchestra. Superintendent and Mrs. Laughlin plan to continue this custom of banqueting the school's staff, the board of control and friends. This is the Laughlins' third year at the school.

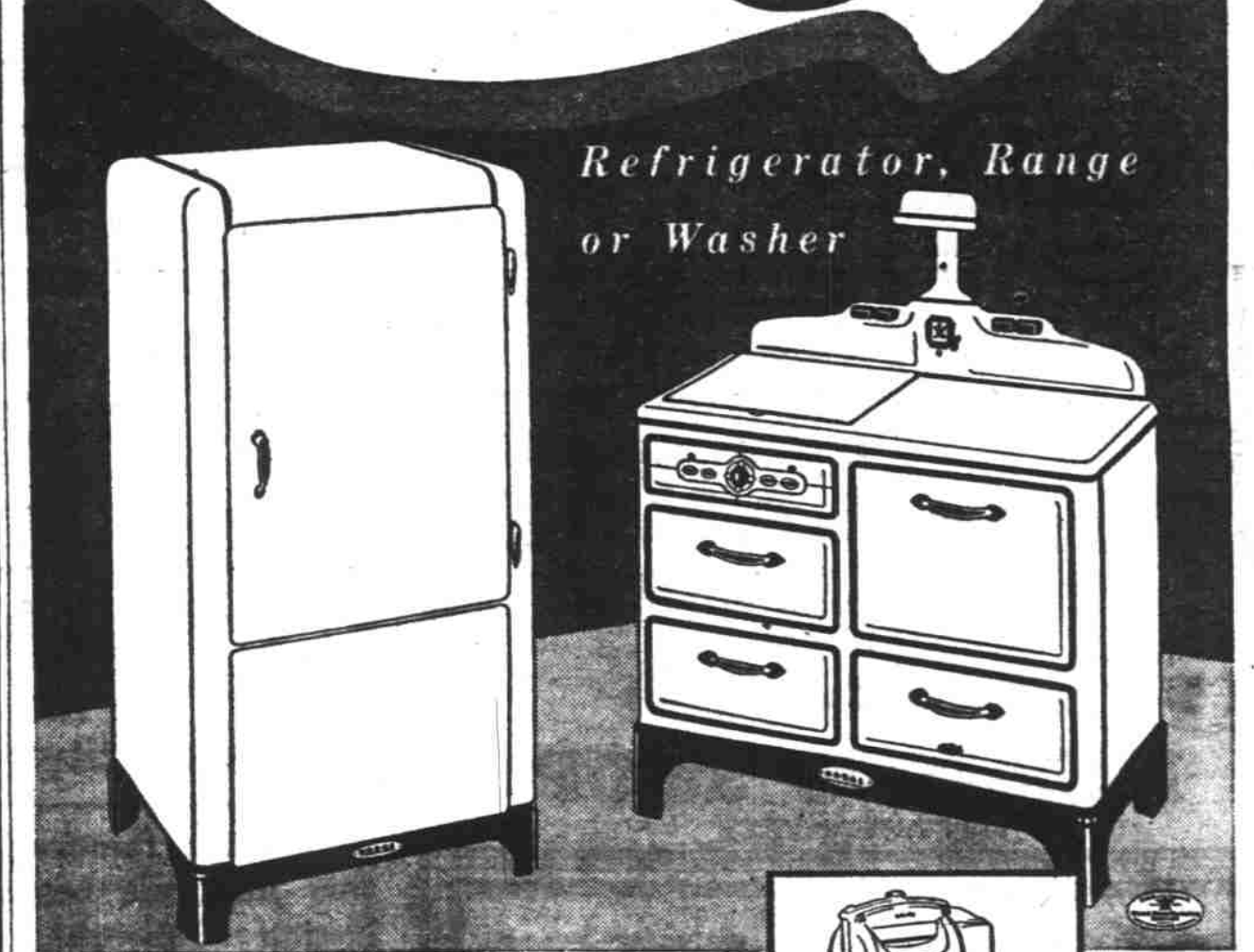
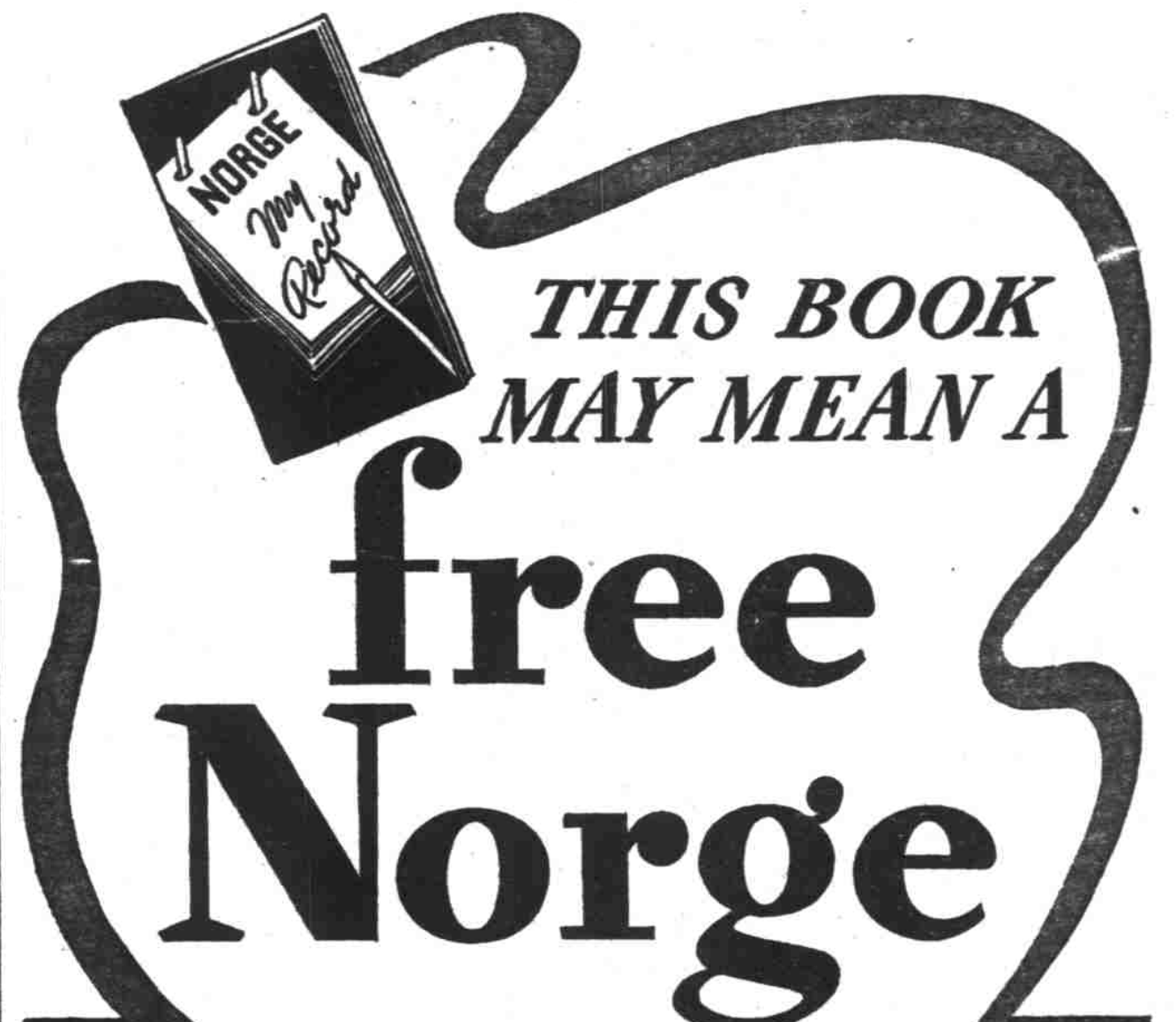
