

"In our report on standardized salaries for workers in different departments, we will recommend the dismissal of married women," Cover said yesterday. "Of course the recommendations will not be binding as far as we are concerned; each department head must handle the matter as he sees fit."

Action Aiready Taken Cover said a number of departments had already eliminated married women from their staffs. He expects to release his longdelayed salary standardization report by the end of this month. Reports earlier this month were that the budget department would relax its protest at married women's employment. This Cover denied vesterday.
