Miss Thielson Comments On Metropolitan Project

An opportunity which has never before been offered young singers in America awaits them this coming year at the Metropolitan Opera company in New York. Following the regular winter season, Edward Johnson, impresario, has announced a three-months post season of popular operas to be offered at popular prices and to be given mostly in English.

Featured in these operas will be young American singers selected through auditions. Miss Nancy Thielson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. D. Thielson who is spending the summer with her parents here, spoke enthusiastically of the project last week.

Miss Thielson, whose rich soprano voice is well known to Salem, Portland and Eugene audiences, has been studying voice with Arthur Rosenstein for two years in New York. This is her first visit home in that time.

Rosenstein is one of the three foremost coaches and accompanists in the east. Lessons three times a week and choir and concert engagements keep the young vocalist exceedingly busy. She is the youngest member of the Riverside church choir and has been with it ever since her arrival in New York. Miss Thielson was one of the few selected from the choir to sing with Walter Damrosch and his orchestra at a Madison Square garden benefit.

Tells Solo Work
"My biggest thrill was singing for an actor's benefit with Arthur Anderson, basso, from the Metropolitan. To think that I was entertaining a group who had spent their lives entertaining others was most exciting," she said. In her two years of study, Miss Thielson has learned 12 operatic roles. The young artist has appeared in recitals in Schenectady, Brooklyn, and Riverside church in New York and in Westfield, N. J.

Today Miss Thielson is at her mother's home for a sojourn at Suttle Lake and in September will return to the east to continue her music.
