Gives Up Engineering Task With SERA; Takes Office With Bartholomew

Partially Blind Indian Is Killed When Train Hits

PENDLETON, Ore., July 20.—(AP)—Partially-blind Eli Parr, 67, Umatilla reservation Indian, was a familiar figure here and was given the "run of the town."

But last night he wandered onto the railroad tracks and was killed by a Union Pacific train. Switchmen told officers Parr apparently was unaware of the approaching engine.

Egg Foo Young Mix six eggs, well beaten, with 1 can of bean sprouts and mixed vegetables, well drained, 1/4 cup cold chicken or pork, shredded fine, 1/4 cup onion, shredded, in a skillet. Fry in cake form until golden brown on each side. Serve with soy-bean sauce, which has been thickened with cornstarch. This recipe serves six generously.

Chinese Chop Suey

1/2 cup onion, cut fine 3 tablespoons fat 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup celery, cut fine and cooked 2 cups cooked bean sprouts 1/2 cup thickened meat stock 1/2 cup water 1 can Chinese bean sprouts 1 teaspoon brown sugar 2 teaspoons soy sauce

Japanese Platter

2 cups cooked rice 2 eggs 1/2 cup grated cheese 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup melted butter 1/2 cup melted butter, salt, peas and half a pound of cheese thoroughly with the rice. Spread on a buttered ovenproof platter.
