## Lo! New "Richest Indian"

Thirty years ago a founding left on the doorstep of an Oklahoma banker and cattleman, Enos Wilson, a member of the Creek tribe, today is recognized as the "world's richest Indian." The title was previously held by Jackson Barnett, also a Creek Indian, who died at the age of 92 last year. Some say Barnett's death was hastened by the weight of domestic and government troubles, which beset him in his last days. Wilson, who made his "pile" in oil, lives in a stately mansion at Muskogee, Oklahoma.

## Banks Charges Attempts to Poison Him in Prison; Says Wife Alienated by Enemies

Coincident with the filing of a petition for an investigation which might lead to his pardon by the governor was the release of an affidavit signed by L. A. Banks, which received publication in the Medford News, his one-time newspaper, now edited by Moore Hamilton, member of the legislature. The statement, extending over 12 typewritten pages, contains wild charges that attempts have been made to poison him, knife him and otherwise dispose of him, that his wife has been alienated from him by his enemies, and that William Levens, special prosecutor declared that Banks was "being framed," and carries the innuendo that Levens "was poisoned."

Banks further asserts that bi-chloride of mercury was found in his sugar jar in his cell, though the prison officials waited eight days for an investigation after it was reported to them.

The statement which was published in Medford revived alarm over his possible release, residents there believing him to be suffering from delusions of persecution and to be dangerous if set at liberty. Mrs. Henrietta Martin, president of the "Good Government Congress" which backed Banks and Earl Fehl during the Jackson county disturbance, is quoted in the Medford News as being opposed to the move to pardon Banks.

At the penitentiary no foundation is given to Banks' story of poison in his sugar. It was also stated that Mrs. Banks continues to visit him, though not so frequently as in the past, because he has been dissatisfied because she did not make greater efforts for his release.

some of which are only two and one-half inches in diameter, with large mains that should be adequate for their lifetime, and to eliminate all dead-ends on mains and thereby create a continuous circulation of water through all lines. New mains will be laid sufficiently deep to keep the water cool in the summer months, Rostein said.

As soon as the plan for the improved system is completed, the commission will request the city council to sell more water bonds to finance the reconstruction operations.

While the improvements are being made, the commission will study sources of water supply, expecting within a short time to ascertain the best from the standpoint of purity and economy.

## WALLACE DEFENDS PROCESSING TAXES

"If the tariff were sliced proportionally we would have the lowest tariff ever in effect during a democratic administration," Wallace declared.

The secretary insisted the processing tax was only a small burden on the consumer compared to its wide benefits to agricultural districts of the United States, and he assailed the high protective tariff as the heaviest burden the consumer ever has had to bear.

"If the processing tax is eliminated, if this year's crop produces an exportable surplus of 250,000,000 bushels and if the sacred Smoot-Hawley tariff is continued, wheat will be down to 20 cents a bushel in this Pacific northwest," he warned.

## SLOT DEVICE CASE IS DELAYED AGAIN

Trial of Dave Scott for maintaining slot machines, coming up on appeal from justice court, was slated for today before Judge McMahan in circuit court, but has been set over until the September term, due to absence of Scott's attorney, Guy Smith, in eastern Oregon.

Scott was one of a group of beer garden and pool hall operators picked up in a slot machine raid conducted some months ago by state police. In the lower court, Judge Hayden fined each defendant \$50 and ordered confiscation of the slot machines.

Judge McMahan has had under advisement for some time a motion for confiscation of the machines. Five men were arrested in the raid in which 13 slot machines were taken last November 10, and so far two of the cases, all of which were appealed, have come before McMahan.

## RELIGIOUS GROUPS DECLARED MENACE

BERLIN, July 22.—(AP)—The Nazi regime tonight smashed at organizations of confessional (Roman Catholic and Lutheran) youth with the statement:

"The leadership of the state can no longer look on idly at this activity which in the course of events brought about a general danger to public security and order."

Wilhelm Frick, minister of the interior, ordered all state govern-

ments to forbid all so-called confessional youth organizations to appear as such outside their churches and parish buildings and to wear any distinctive garb or emblem in church or out.

The burgomaster of Duisburg enjoined all public officials and laborers employed by the city to give up their membership in confessional workers' organizations and compel their children to resign from confessional youth organizations on pain of losing their jobs.

## GENERAL STRIKE IS ON AT TERRE HAUTE

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., July 22.—(AP)—A sudden general strike brought virtually complete business paralysis to Terre Haute tonight, stopped the normal flow of food and other necessities to its 66,000 inhabitants and forced strict military rule by nearly 2000 national guardsmen.

Doors of almost every retail establishment swung shut as roving bands of strikers canvassed the city, urging a complete cessation of business.

Groceries, ice, gasoline and other necessities could not be bought. The chamber of commerce, while declining to estimate how many stores had closed, estimated the loss to business in the first day of the strike at \$200,000.

The guardsmen, moving into towns under orders of Adjutant General Elmer J. Straub at the plea of local authorities, dispersed gatherings and kept crowds moving along the streets.

Early violence, however, was limited to sporadic fist fights.

## Governor Closes More of Forests

Governor Martin issued a proclamation Monday closing to entry except by permit a large part of the Umpqua and Coos Bay watersheds in Coos and Douglas counties.

The closure order was requested by Lynn Cronmiller, state forester, because of fire conditions.

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
