Tax Bill Drifting Down Middle Road

Indications came during the day that the president's tax bill was drifting along a middle-of-the-road course. Democratic members of the house ways and means committee agreed that the new inheritance taxes should bear less heavily on close-of-kind than on "strangers of blood" relatives inheriting money.

The tax plan is the key log of the jam holding congress through hot summer weeks. New republican insistence for quick adjournment arose today. Senator Hastings (D-De) introduced a resolution calling for adjournment August 10.

ing machine for handling August water bills. Whether this machine will become the property of the city is still in doubt, with the water company contending it belongs to its divisional offices serving seven city systems rather than to the Salem system alone.

The commission clarified its recent request for assistance of company employees in starting office work under city supervision to make it definite that their services should be advisory only and Van Patten should have full charge of the work.

The water rate schedules and rules now in effect were continued by the commission until changes may be found advisable. Van Patten suggested the city council be asked to enact an ordinance providing that property owners shall be held responsible for payment of water bills, as is done in Portland.

ready to allow export of much-needed arms to Ethiopia. At Rome Italian newspapers, continuing their bitter attacks on Japan's "march" in the African issue, editorially hailed approaching Italian war games as proof of Premier Mussolini's intention to keep full military strength at home despite the dispatch of thousands of troops to Africa. Government estimates slumped in the face of the decree allowing the government to lower the lira's gold content.

At Tokyo Japanese newspapers published editorials attacking Italy for injecting the racial issue into the controversy over Ethiopia. A hot domestic political fight was promised over what Japan did, or did not, tell Italy concerning Ethiopia.

At Paris Premier Laval promised Britain he would support her efforts to get Mussolini to discuss the entire range of the Italo-Ethiopian crisis, although he was reported to have opposed any "strong" policy with Il Duce.

July 31 Is Last Date for Filing Of Tax Returns

J. W. Maloney, collector of internal revenue, announces that no general extension of time for filing capital stock tax returns for 1935, will be made. Nor will specific extensions be granted for reasons such as (1) the corporate officers are away on business, (2) pressure of business or (3) unavailability of the corporation's accountant or attorney.

An application for extension on other grounds must state the reason therefor, the length of time desired which cannot be beyond September 29, 1935, and must be signed under oath by an officer of the corporation.

Corporations are urged to file capital stock tax returns on or before July 31, in order to avoid the penalties provided in the law for failure to file on time.

Bradley Offers Telescope's Use Each Wednesday

For the convenience of persons interested in gazing at the heavens through a reflector type telescope, B. L. "Buck" Bradley, amateur astronomer, yesterday announced he would be at home to visitors each Wednesday night. Bradley has two such telescopes, one with five and the other with eight-inch reflector, both of which he constructed himself.

The recent eclipse of the moon, viewed through Bradley's telescopes by more than 120 persons, has greatly increased interest of the citizenry in observing the stars through his instruments, he said.

THE DALLES, Ore., July 23.—(P)—Frank Heckman, 32, instructor at The Dalles high school, died shortly after noon today as a result of a bullet wound, apparently self-inflicted. Death occurred at the home of his parents here.

Transatlantic Air Service in 20 Hours Predicted

New York-to-Paris air service in 20 hours is foreseen in the near future by Igor Sikorsky, pioneer aviation expert and famous designer. He foresees the evolution of new super-ships weighing 500 tons and having a wing spread of more than 400 feet. The aerial ocean liner of the future will have a

promenade deck, spacious cabins in the 12-foot wings and all accommodations of a travelling hotel according to Sikorsky. His prediction is based on the successful flights of the giant clipper ships, recently put into service in the Pacific, which were designed by him.

SETTING OF PRUNE PRICE IS DELAYED

Members of the Oregon Prune Control Board, Inc., met in executive session at the Marion hotel with independent and cooperative prune packers. Prune prices and marketing conditions were discussed.

The board declined to name prices for dried prunes for the 1935 season based on the usual differential between California and Oregon quotations and deferred final action until the next meeting to be held early in August.

Opening prices in California will return to their growers approximately 4c for 30-40's, 3c for 40-50's, and 2c for 50-60's.

The prune control board refused to authorize sales by Oregon growers on that basis at this time.

North Bend May Change Name but Opposes Merger

NORTH BEND, Ore., July 23.—(P)—The North Bend city council tonight voted to take necessary steps at once to change the name of North Bend to "Coo's Bay."

The decision to file affidavits with the secretary of state to change the city's name followed action by the city fathers, who unanimously refused to have anything to do with a possible merger of North Bend and Marshfield, the twin cities on Coo's bay.

The council voted to have nothing to do with a proposed study by the state planning board of the merger, and directed that the mayor and aldermen or other city officials refrain from affixing their names to any letter or petition asking the services of the state planning board in such a matter.

CITY ISN'T LIABLE IN ACCIDENT CASE

Supreme Court Backs Ruling
of McMahan in Keeney,
Rundlett Cases

The city of Salem is not liable for damages resulting from the operation of a police car which ran down and injured Minnie D. Keeney, the state supreme court held yesterday.

The opinion was written by Chief Justice Campbell and upheld the decree of Judge McMahan of the Marion county circuit court. The lower court held for the city of Salem.

Mrs. Keeney alleged that at the time she was struck by the car Carl Charlton, police officer, was transporting ex-Mayor Gregory from the city hall to his home. She contended he was not acting within the scope of his official duties.

Justice Campbell held that the city of Salem could not be held liable for the negligent acts of its servants outside the scope of the authority of the servant or outside the power of, or duty devolving upon the municipality.

Not on City Duty
"The officer, at the time of the injury complained of, was clearly acting outside the scope of his authority and his action was never ratified by the city," Justice Campbell held.

Charlton was named as a defendant in the suit. A demurrer filed by Charlton was not at issue before the supreme court. Mrs. Keeney sued for \$10,000.

The court also affirmed Judge McMahan in a suit brought by Maud B. Rundlett to recover \$3,200 damages from Simon and Helen Director, operators of "Director's department store" here. The lower court held for the plaintiff.

The plaintiff alleged that she suffered permanent injuries when she stubbed her toe and fell on the store floor. The accident occurred on September 15, 1930.
