The chamber of commerce here has been asked again to edit the city of Salem statistical information in the directory. For the first time in years, the chamber's cut of the beautiful Oregon capitol, which burned last April 22, will not be included in the directory.

Asks for Time—Walter Williams, arrested for alleged larceny of a propeller, propeller shaft and wrought iron used in construction of boats from the Spaulding Logging company, asked 24 hours time in which to enter plea when he was brought before Justice of the Peace Miller Hayden. Bond Bids to Be Opened—The state highway commission will open bids Thursday in Portland on a \$3,000,000 issue of highway bonds designed to take up that amount of toll-bridge bonds now held by PWA. Later this year \$1,200,000 in short-term bonds will be issued to pay for the remainder of the state's share in the construction of the five Oregon coast highway bridges.

Postcard Years Late—Time apparently is not an important element in the operation of Oregon's postal service. A postal card mailed to the secretary of state August 20, 1929, from Astoria, reached the state department Tuesday, almost six years behind schedule. The card was sent by J. D. Hallberg and acknowledged receipt of a state warrant mailed by Hal E. Hoss, then secretary of state.

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Opens Credit Company—Floyd E. RAILROAD BUILDING TRACK AT DETROIT

Sawmill Activity Reviving; Breitenbush Area Gets Many Tourists Now

Salem folks returning from a vacation in the Detroit area state that the Southern Pacific railroad is rebuilding its track from Detroit to Idanha, a distance of six miles, with 60 men working on the project. A number of small lumber mills are opening up in that area.

At Idanha a new shingle mill is in operation with from 15 to 20 men on the payroll, and a new sawmill, with machinery taken from the old Albany plant, is near completion in this section. At Detroit, Evans Brothers are operating a sawmill moved there from Gates, and several other small plants are entering the field.

Detroit-Breitenbush Loop Travel Heavy
Travel in the Detroit-Breitenbush loop has opened up, and many cars are reported to be making the trip from government camp to Breitenbush, a distance of 64 miles. This is one stretch of the loop which is expected to come into popular use as a weekend jaunt for Portlanders, taking them into the Breitenbush country via the Mt. Hood road and back through Salem.

Damages to the roads in the Breitenbush lake area due to heavy snowfall and trees blown across the road have been entirely repaired, and travel along the route is excellent now. Both Skiff's and Bruckman's camps at the springs are doing good business this season and are filled to capacity most of the time, the Salem folks declare.

SIMON NEW HEAD, BUSINESS LEAGUE

Lawrence N. Simon of the Salem Hardware company has been named president of the Salem Business Men's league to serve for the remainder of the year, Joseph Hermann who held the post having gone to Portland.
