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deep, with light flaky pastry. Spread over a layer of sliced apricots. Cover with a thick layer of fresh apricots, peeled and stoned and halved. Sprinkle with sugar, allowing 1/4 cup for each dozen apricots. Cover with a sheet of flaky pastry, moistening the edges and pressing with a fork to seal the edges securely. Care must be taken that the upper crust has no opening. Bake in a moderate oven from 45 to 50 minutes. When done, spread top crust with a thin layer of the sliced apricots and sift granulated sugar lightly over this. Place some distance from the gas flame in the broiling oven until the sugar melts. Serve hot with a cream sweetened and flavored with vanilla. Canned apricots may be used in place of the fresh fruit. Serves 6 to 8.

FREQUENT TESTING OF WATER PLANNED

Plans to take even greater precautions than the water company in testing the water supply here are being made, according to Cuyler Van Patten, who will manage the plant under municipal ownership beginning next Thursday. Not aiming criticism at the company's methods, Van Patten yet intends that all possible pre-

cautions to insure pure water shall be taken and has the commission's backing, it was indicated yesterday.

Van Patten was considering instituting daily bacteria tests of the water, to be made by a disinterested agency. The company takes such tests twice a week and each hour checks the chlorine content of the water before it leaves the filter beds on Minto's island.

The chlorine test, itself, is accurate in determining whether or not the water will be free from contamination, according to Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer. Water samples taken from city and private supplies throughout the county by the county department are tested in the state department of health laboratory at Portland.

Lucille McBride Member of WPA Staff in Salem
