

SALEM SECTION GETS \$429,000

Grade Separation Project Grant is \$305,000 and Highway Also Aided

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of \$875,000 of the issue bears 1 1/2 per cent and mature in 1944; \$750,000 bear 2 1/2 per cent, maturing in 1949 and the remaining \$1,575,000 bear 2 1/2 per cent, maturing in 1960. The highway commissioners expressed themselves as well pleased with the price.

Allot Two Millions For Later Projects

In addition to the \$5,875,000 earmarked today for highway work, Chairman H. F. Cabell announced another \$2,000,000 will be utilized to finance highway improvements in municipal areas and county roads. A total of \$7,875,000 of the original \$9,000,000 in state and highway funds already has been allotted, including the allocations today.

Included in the \$5,875,000 was \$1,175,000 for regular federal aid projects, \$2,000,000 for highway relief projects and \$1,700,000 for grade separation relief projects.

Among the regular federal aid projects were:

Mollala river bridge near Canby, \$65,000; Santiam highway bridge \$25,000; Salem-south section of Pacific highway, grading, \$70,000; Rex hill section grading and paving \$175,000; Siskiyou mountain section of Pacific highway, grading, \$120,000; Turkey Hill section of Pacific highway near Oakland, \$118,800. Other allotments in this category went to the Old Oregon Trail, highways and bridges in the Klamath Falls area, improvements near Bonneville, Wolf Creek highway bridge, approaches to Coos Bay and Umpqua bridges, John Day highway and in Portland area.

Grading on South Santiam Approved

Included in the highway relief projects were:

Clackamas river bridge at Estacada, \$30,000; Salem-south section of Pacific highway, grading, \$54,000; south Santiam highway, grading, \$100,000; Junction City-Eugene grading, \$200,000. Other projects include grading and bridges on the Wolf creek and Wilson river roads, coast highway tunnel at Neahkahnie, Alsea bridge approaches, Corvallis highway, Columbia River bridge, Ashland-Neil creek section of Pacific highway, Island City-Cove road and I. O. N. highway.

Grade separation projects included:

Southern Pacific railway, Pacific highway at Salem, \$305,000; Southern Pacific railway west of Eugene, Pacific highway, \$120,000; Southern Pacific railway, Siskiyou mountains, Pacific highway, \$205,000. Other projects include several near Portland and on the Old Oregon Trail.

Ray Conway, manager of the Oregon State Motor association, and Harold B. Say of Portland, were named by the commission as members of a publicity committee to attract out-state motorists.

A Lane county delegation, headed by Earl Hill of Cushman, asked for improvements to the Siuslaw-Junction City highway.

Blanket Insurance Policy is Ordered

A blanket insurance policy protecting the city from fire loss on the plant as well as from liability, was ordered placed through the Salem association of insurance agents, Ed Rostel, chairman of the commission, specifically provided that his insurance agency was not to have its ratable share in this policy.

The commission fixed the salary of J. T. Delaney, manager of the Oregon-Washington Water Service company, at \$300 a month for the time he is to serve the city. That period has heretofore been set at 60 days or less.

The city is to take over the plant here at midnight, July 31. Manager Van Patten was authorized to confer with an accountant regarding the correct setup of the new system of books the city expects to install when it begins its operations of the plant.

Compromise Method of Qualifying Adopted

Out of the conflict yesterday came this decision by the convention:

Credentials committee will limit its voting today to:

1. Any person belonging to an affiliated club of the Oregon Republican clubs.

2. Any person belonging to any organization located within any city not having an affiliated club and having for its purpose the furtherance of the republican party.

3. Any person in a city not having a club sponsoring republican activities, but who is a member of the republican party.

This compromise arrangement for accrediting voters at the convention was praised by Emmons, who said that only persons who lived in cities where there are clubs and who failed to take advantage of the chance to become members are thereby excluded from voting.

Henderson also supported the compromise, declaring that the clubs were "not meeting in a plaza." Henderson added: "We are supposed to be here as members of the Oregon Republican clubs."

Today's sessions will be primarily concerned with a series of resolutions on which the convention resolutions committee, headed by Senator Allan Bynon, was working last night.

The veterans' wing in the organization was working hard to include a plank calling for payment of the adjusted service certificates in full while another plank being stressed before the convention committee called for elimination of the federal unbalanced budget.

Other planks tentatively approved for submission today included the following:

Sound national currency on an unchanged gold base.

Maintenance of the right of collective bargaining and of the American standard of living for labor.

Rigid enforcement of anti-trust laws.

Removal of government from competition with all forms of private enterprise except where necessary to develop public works and natural resources.

Condemnation of the democratic party for its political machinations.

The largest project in the group is the University of Oregon heat tunnel, one of four units proposed for the campus there. This unit will cost an estimated \$28,000.

Second largest is from Marion county, the demolition of the state capitol, to carry work ahead of the allotment which runs out August 1. The sum asked for on the WPA project, which is an extension of the SERA project, is \$12,000.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 26.—(AP)—Charles Edward Clark, dean of Yale university law school, tonight expressed belief the supreme court NRA decision is pretty much limited "to the distribution of chickens in Brooklyn."

"The chances are that after the decision has been studied more, the students of our constitution will find that it isn't nearly as far-reaching as it appeared at first," Dean Clark said in an interview here.

"And I hazard a guess," continued the author of many books on legal subjects, "that the court in quite a good many cases that grow out of the present AAA provisions will uphold the law, such as the regulations in regard to milk and others that provide for the regulation of different farm products."
