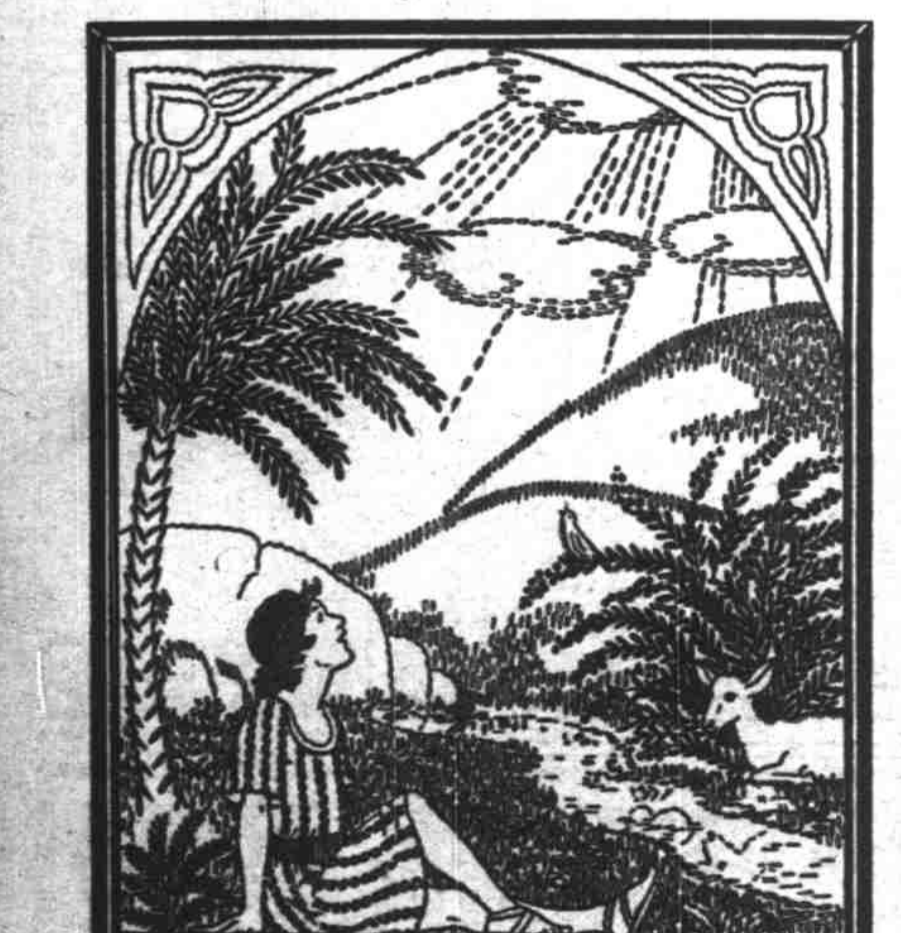

"Elegance in fabrics, elegance in designs and especially elegance displayed in more extensive wardrobes to be worn by Mrs. and Miss America, this fall and winter, will make the season of 1935-1936 memorable indeed," states Orry-Kelly, noted motion picture designer.

"Smart clothes—clothes of the moment—will adhere more strictly to the demands of the occasion when they are to be worn," says Orry-Kelly, "and they will necessarily display an elegance that has been sadly wanting for a long, long time."
"Within three months the new gored and flared skirts which we have just begun to see will be three times as full, and we may even see the return of beffuffed taffeta petticoats for daytime use."
"Eight months ago I predicted and introduced a Grecian vogue which was later taken up by leading designers. This Grecian vogue—in a more authentically simple mood and showing much more of the figure—with less pleated fullness and with body lines accentuated to with drapes and folds, will dominate the evening scene wherever clinging fabrics are used."
