Man Giving Name Johnson Captured, Says Other One Killed Daw

Chief Daw and Malone had stepped from their machine and shouted an order to halt, the traffic officer reported.

Johnson was captured by Stephen Abgaroff and Charles Tracy of Dunsmuir. He was armed with a pistol, from which officers said several shots had been fired.

Officers said Johnson admitted he and his companion held up Mike Padula, Castella restaurant man, last night and took \$55.

Johnson was quoted by officers as saying that Miller had fired the fatal shots and was the leader in the holdup.

Daw, who was 39 years old, had been chief of police two years. He leaves his widow and three children.

MEDFORD, Ore., July 29.—(AP)—F. R. "Jack" Daw, chief of police at Dunsmuir, Cal., who was slain by bandits, formerly was a resident of this city. Daw was born here and his mother, Mrs. Joseph Coleman, still makes her residence in Medford.

George Malone, who was wounded in the same fracas at Dunsmuir, also was well known here, having assisted in the arrest of the Urshel kidnappers.
