PLAYGROUND STAFF FUTURE UNCERTAIN

Change From SERA to PWA May Mean Curtailment of Some Activities

The switch in work relief from SERA to PWA, which will transpire Thursday, had Vernon Gilmore, superintendent of the Salem playgrounds, in a quandary yesterday as to whether or not he would promptly receive from WPA the services of 49 playground instructors and attendants who have been on duty daily under the SERA. He stated, however, that he had a large enough staff paid by the city and school district to permit continuance of the playground program on at least a curtailed basis.

The payroll for relief playground workers is made up from a state recreation project in effect under the SERA. No word had been received here yesterday as to when an application for a similar project under the WPA would be approved.

If it is found Thursday that the relief workers are no longer available at the playgrounds, at least temporarily, the daily swimming periods at both pools may be cut short but an adequate corps of lifeguards will be on duty, Gilmore said. He has six guards on the staff who are not paid from relief funds, in addition to Harold Hank, Olinger playground supervisor, and Gurnee Fleisher, Leslie supervisor, and the two activities supervisors, Helene Price and Isobel Morehouse.

The playground swimming season is now scheduled to close September 1. Gilmore said if funds were available and the weather favorable, the season might be extended for two weeks longer.

Mission Worker of El Salvador Speaks Tonight

Rev. Ralph Williams, missionary to the Republic of El Salvador, will speak at Evangelistic Tabernacle at 13th and Ferry streets at 7:45 tonight. Rev. Williams has labored in various Latin-American countries for nine and one-half years, the last four and one-half of which have been in El Salvador where through the success of his labors a native organization of over 50 churches has been established.

These evangelizing efforts were carried on in the face of considerable persecution and trial in which 20 native Christians have already been martyred and wherein Williams himself narrowly escaped death on more than one occasion. He will soon return to El Salvador to carry on the work begun there. He is working under the auspices of the Assemblies of God with headquarters at Springfield, Mo.

Williams will show a number of color lantern slides of his work. There will be no admission charged.

Dr. Townsend to Attend District Meet at Albany

Dr. F. E. Townsend, head of the pension movement bearing his name, will attend the first congressional district Townsend club convention at Bryant park, Albany, August 14, according to word received here. His appearance and address at the convention is expected to attract many additional club members to the affair, which will begin at 10 a. m.

Other speakers to appear on the program are George Magwood, John J. Jeffries, Jack Bardee, Dwight Bunnell of Portland and others.

Dr. Townsend will be in Portland August 2, 3 and 4, en route to Spokane, Wash.
