Perfect Attendance Marks Made by Nearly Thousand; 17,735 Attend in County

Nearly 1000 Marion county school boys and girls, or an exact 985, in the eight elementary grades had perfect attendance records during the 1934-35 school year, according to data compiled by Mrs. Mary L. Fulkerson, county school superintendent, in her annual report of schools in the county. Compilation of the report will be finished by the end of this week, it is expected.

The average daily attendance in the elementary grades was 94 per cent, in the high schools, 95 per cent, and in the junior high schools, 93 per cent, making an average of 94 per cent for the entire county.

This attendance average is about two per cent lower than usual, but is due to heavier inroads of contagious diseases in school attendance last year and quarantines necessary because of these diseases.

Few Drop Out, Shown
The annual report shows that 17,735 children were on the school rolls, and further that there

was little drop in attendance from class to class until the 11th year in school was reached. The attendance in each grade follows: First grade, 1237; second, 1093; third, 1121; fourth, 1154; fifth, 1221; sixth, 1239; seventh, 1219; eighth, 1198; ninth, 1198; tenth, 1081; 11th, 815; 12th, 717. Of the total 17,735, 9023 were boys and 8712 were girls.

In the pre-school years on which the census roll is based, there were 397 boys and 498 girls four years old; 439 boys and 454 girls, five years old; and 519 boys and 525 girls, six years old.

The county has 13 private schools, in which the enrollment was 1176, with 570 boys and 606 girls. In the private schools, 53 teachers were in charge, with 47 of these women and 12 men.

Virtually all the school reports from district clerks have been checked by the county school auditor, and the clerks may call at the superintendent's office at any time to obtain their records, Mrs. Fulkerson states.

NO PRICE SET YET FOR PICKING HOPS

No price has yet been established for the 1935 season, according to information yesterday, although it is presumed a tentative picking price will be set by growers' agreement about a week before the harvest starts.

Present indications are that the first picking of early fuggies will get under way August 21. To date, the hops are of excellent quality.

Recent talk of abandonment of some of the 1935 hop crop due to extremely low market price is discounted by some of the older growers, who state such talk is probably just talk. They point out that such threats have been voiced from time to time in past years, but that the actual process has not been carried out.

Registration of hop pickers is moving slower than usual this year, according to reports from one of the largest growers in the hop game. No definite reason has been assigned to this and there is hope that the next two weeks will see a more active interest in hop harvest jobs.

Liquidation by Individual Not Legal Is Ruling

The state corporation commissioner has no authority to delegate any citizen or group the administration of a savings and loan association taken over by the department for liquidation. Attorney General Van Winkle held Tuesday.

The opinion was requested by Charles Carey, state corporation commissioner, after it was proposed by some stockholders of the Union Savings and Loan association to place the liquidation in the hands of an individual. Liquidation of the association has been delayed by litigation now pending in the United States district court of appeals. The hearing has been set for September 9.

GRANT FOR HEALTH SERVICE WILL HELP

Allotment of \$3,450,000 of work relief funds to the public health service by President Roosevelt yesterday, was good news to Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, Marion county health officer, he indicated last night. This fund is to be spent for house-to-house canvass studies of long standing illnesses, to conduct physical examinations and to make a survey of medical facilities, particularly for chronic cases.

The surveys "should give us a better idea of what our problems are and where and when they are," Dr. Douglas commented. "They will tell us whether we are emphasizing certain phases of health work too much and some not enough."

The health department here has received no information as to the federal health program plans other than through the newspapers.

Willamette Reading Rooms Open This Summer as Staff is on Hand

Salem alumni and prospective students are using the facilities of the Willamette university library, which is open daily, except Sunday, during the summer months, Robinson Spencer, librarian, said yesterday.

Miss Edna Westenhouse, assistant librarian who recently returned from the University of Illinois, where she received the degree of bachelor of science in library science, and Spencer, are both spending the entire summer in Salem, working daily at the library in preparation for the coming school year. About half of their time is spent in the law library, cataloguing books to fulfill requirements of standardization of the law school. The law library is being greatly enlarged, both in the number of books and space available.

Apiary Licenses Are Obtainable At 'Ag' Offices

Licenses for bee apiaries should be obtained at the state department of agriculture offices on 12th street, and not at the office of the county clerk in the courthouse.

For several weeks past, the county clerk and his deputies have received from one to four inquiries daily about these licenses. In order to save owners of bees a needless trip, the clerk's office passes the word along that the state department, as above stated, takes care of the matter.

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
