OVER HUNDRED ARE TAUGHT SWIMMING

Instruction Continued and List Grows Although Campaign Ended

One hundred ten boys and girls have been taught to swim at the two city playgrounds pools to date this season, according to reports compiled yesterday by Vernon Gilmore, superintendent of recreation. Since the Red Cross learn-to-swim campaign closed July 15 approximately 16 boys and girls have learned to swim in the playground classes.

The campaign resulted in 20 girls and 13 boys learning to swim at Olinger pool and 16 girls and 29 boys at Leslie, 11 girls and four boys passing advanced swimmer tests at Olinger and twenty five boys and girls passed junior and 21 senior lifesavers' examinations.

Swimming instruction to beginners and advanced swimmers is offered at both pools daily excepting Saturdays and Sundays on the following schedule:

10-10:30 a. m.—Beginner boys;

10:30-11 a. m.—beginner girls; 11:11-45 — advanced swimmers, and also, 11-11:30 p. m.—instruction for women; 7-7:30 p. m.—beginner and advanced adults. The remainder of the time between 11:45 a. m. and 8 p. m. is open to all persons.

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NEW TRIAL SOUGHT IN SILVERTON CASE

Motion for a new trial was filed yesterday by attorneys in the circuit court case of Evelyn R. Umphlette vs. the City of Silverton and I. D. Worden and wife. A jury in circuit court here earlier this month found for Miss Umphlette and awarded her more than \$5000 damages.

The motion for new trial is based on alleged error at law by the court in admission of evidence and denial of defendant's motion for non-suit and a directed verdict.

The damage case required the better part of a week in Judge McMahon's court here, and resulted from permanent injuries Miss Umphlette, a Silverton school teacher, received to her hand in a fall on a slippery sidewalk at Silverton.
