Graded French combing of this grade sold at prices in the range 67-72 cents secured basis. Original bag lines moved at 70-72 cents secured basis for choice French and strictly combing staple and at 68-70 cents for average to good French combing. A fair amount of strictly choice 64s, 66s, 68s blood territory wool sold recently at 56-58 cents secured basis.
