

Amity Taxpayers Authorize New \$35,000 Grade School

BONDS CARRY BY BIG VOTE

Structure Will Replace One Built 60 Years Ago; Funerals Held

AMITY, July 31.—At a meeting of the taxpayers of school district No. 4 held Monday afternoon in the Amity grade school building, bonds were voted, two to one, to build a \$35,000 grade school building to replace the 60-year old building now in use. The new building will be a one-story structure and will occupy the present site of the old one. It will have a modern heating plant, a physical education room and a nurse's office in addition to the regular class rooms. C. N. Freeman of Portland is the architect.

An application has been made for the WPA grant of 45 per cent, and the building will probably be well under construction this fall.

Blair Johnson of Nyssa; a niece, Mrs. Jessie Johnson of Portland and two grandchildren. Concluding services were held at the Portland crematorium at 2 p. m. Tuesday. Pallbearers were W. W. Dickey, J. Josephine Jones Dies
Gravelside services, conducted by Rev. L. S. Shumaker of McMinnville were held in the Amity cemetery Tuesday morning for Mrs. Josephine Jones, 88, who died at Corvallis Sunday. She was the daughter of John and Sarah Van Buskirk, early pioneers here, and was born in Pulaski, Ohio, June 26, 1847.

In October, 1851, her parents with other relatives, 25 in number, left Ohio and came to Missouri and in the spring of 1852 continued their trek to the Oregon country. Arriving at The Dalles in October. They came to the Willamette valley and settled on a farm west of Amity, now known as the late Charles Mitchell farm. Josephine Van Buskirk was married to Harvey L. Jones of Amity in August, 1864. Four of their five children survive: Weldon M., of Grants Pass, Herbert W., Mrs. Lulu Howard and Mrs. Ruby Chastowall, all of Corvallis.

Mrs. Jones joined the Amity Baptist church in 1858. Her parents and 10 others were the first constituent members of this organization. She was a woman of sterling qualities and fine christian character. She was an invalid for the last six years of her life.

Post Session for State University to Open August 5

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, July 31.—Since all summer sessions of the Oregon State system of higher education have shown a definite increase, and interest has been unusually high in the fields to be offered, the interinstitutional post session to be held at the University of Oregon, August 5 to 30, is expected to set a new record for attendance. It was announced here today by Dr. Dan E. Clark, assistant director of the general extension division.

Post session will offer four intensive weeks of work to students, teachers, summer session students, and others interested in economics, education, English, history, law, physics, psychology and sociology. A total of 44 courses will be offered by 15 faculty members, all of whom are authorities in their respective fields. Registration begins Monday, August 5, and classes will start the same day.

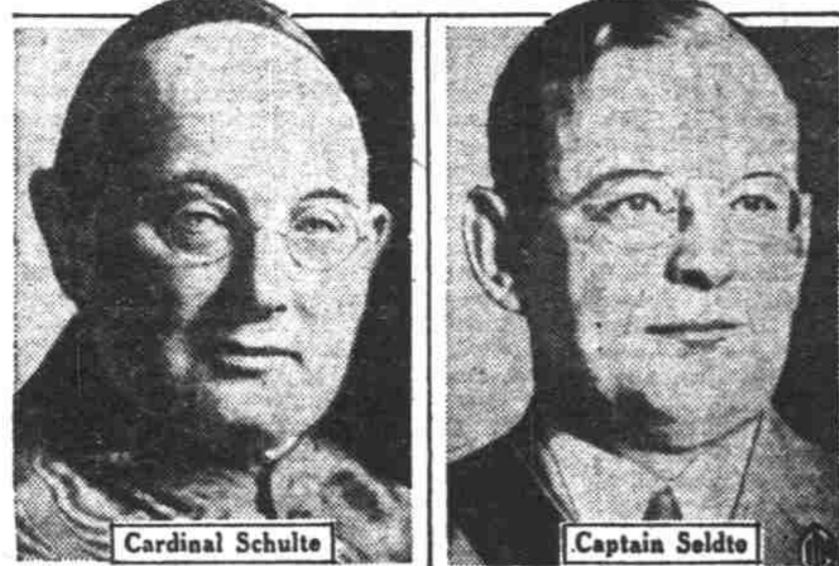
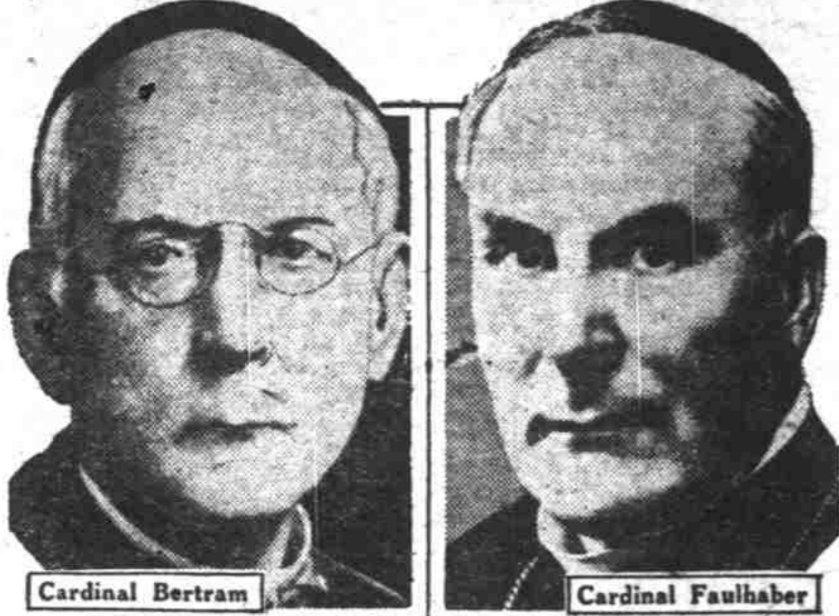
BROWN TAKES BRIDE

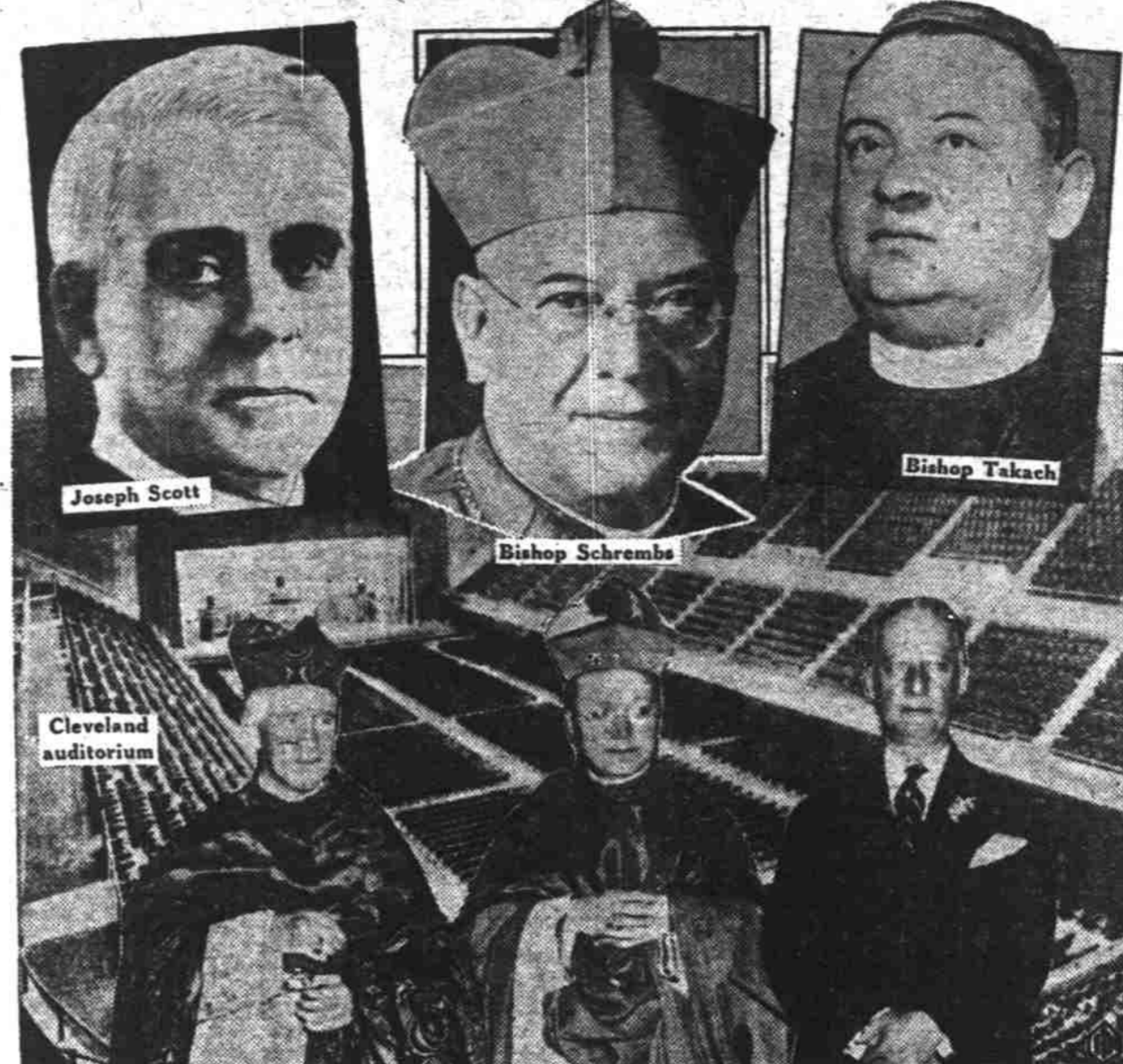
