For Loss

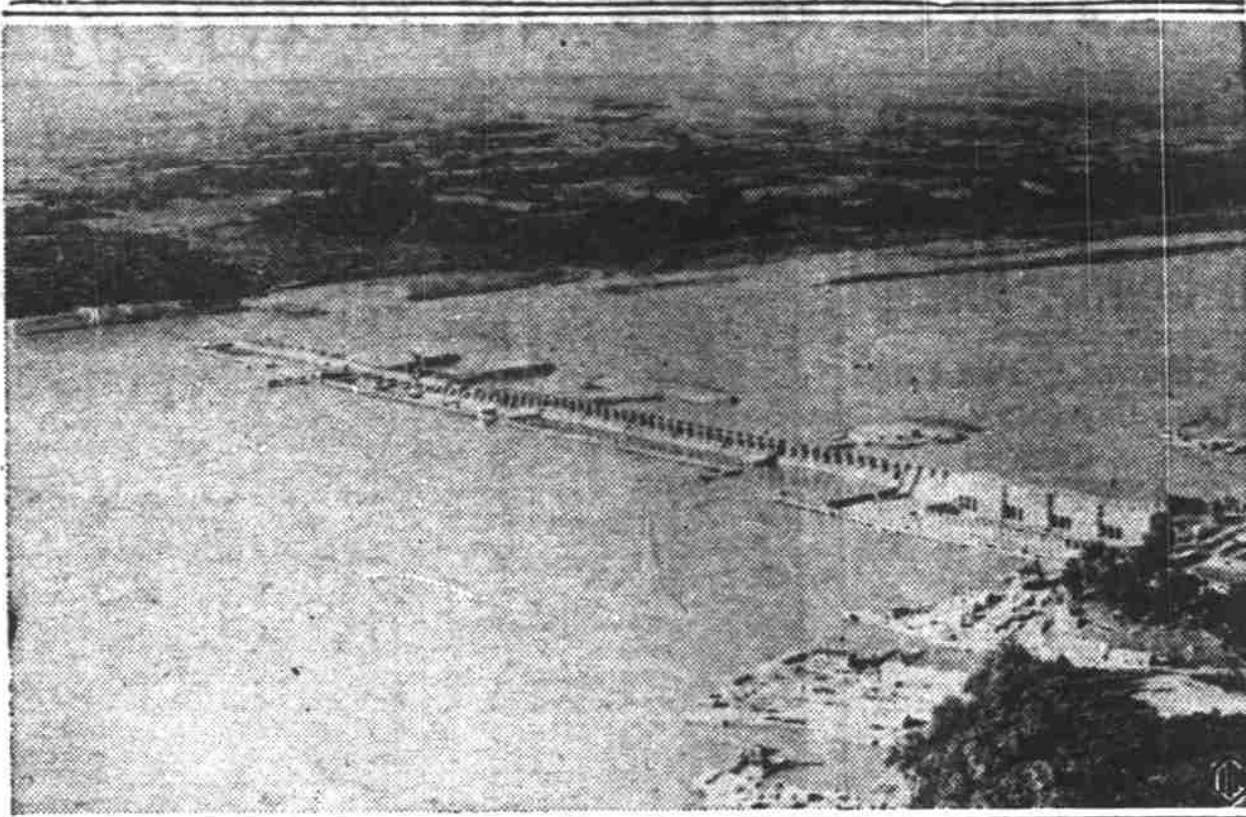

CEMETERY CLEANING PROJECT PROPOSED

Chamber Requests Reports
on Burial Grounds in
Need of WPA Aid

An opportunity to clean up some of the unkempt cemeteries and particularly those where are buried the soldier and pioneer dead, is seen by the Salem chamber of commerce through use of funds from works progress administration, now getting under way. With this idea in view, the chamber is asking for information as to location of all old time cemeteries and, if possible, history of these burial grounds. In this way the chamber will assist a proposition already before the Marion county planning board, to locate graves of all Civil war and Indian war veterans and also graves of pioneers. Where no special trustees function for cemeteries long in use, the chamber asks that persons living nearby take it upon themselves to write or telephone the chamber of location of such places. Under WPA, subject to sponsorship of a taxpaying body, landscaping, tiling, drainage and similar work may be done in cemeteries. It is considered probable some taxpaying body in the district will sponsor the project, or in case a trustee setup is already in operation, trustees may incorporate at small expense to become qualified to ask for the project. This idea enlarges upon the veterans' grave marking plan proposed by E. C. Krueger and Mrs. Mabel Lockwood before the last meeting of the county planning board. All projects proposed for submission to the district WPA offices here must first have approval of the county planning unit.

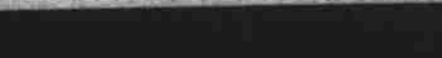
