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picked, are farmers. McMahon said he wanted them to complete their harvest, if possible.

He did not state, however, that he would hold up calling the grand jury, indicating that he would look into the Kellaher case before making up his mind.

Governor Martin said last yesterday that he would not formally request a grand jury probe of the charges against Kellaher until county officials had been given a reasonable time in which to perform their duty. He indicated that there was nothing to prevent county officials from beginning at once to probe the charges against Kellaher.

Ralph E. Moody, representing the attorney general, said he had brought the allegations against Kellaher to light and would make no written request for action until it was seen what the local officials would do. He said that the Marion county district attorney and the presiding judge had full legal authority to proceed without an especial direction from the governor's office or from the attorney general.

Code Relating to Bribery is Quoted

Moody said that the state parole officer, under the 1930 Oregon code, was an executive officer of the state. Bribery or attempted bribery of an executive officer of the state, Moody said, is a criminal offense under the Oregon statute. The penitentiary sentence provided by law runs from five to 15 years. Moody cited the following section of the code regarding bribery:

"If any judicial, legislative, or executive officer shall corruptly accept or receive any gift, gratuity, valuable consideration, anything whatever, or any promise or cause to be done any act beneficial to such officer, with the understanding or agreement, express or implied, that such officer will give his vote, opinion, decision, or judgment in a particular matter in any manner, question, duty, cause, or proceeding which then is or may by law come or be brought before such officer, or with the understanding or agreement that such officer will in his official capacity act in a particular manner, or so as to produce or prevent any particular result, such officer, upon a conviction thereof, shall be punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary not less than five nor more than fifteen years."

REFUSAL OF LIQUOR PERMIT REQUESTED

The first interdiction proceedings since Miller B. Hayden became justice of the peace here came before his court yesterday when Erma DeLapp petitioned the court for a hearing to determine if an interdiction order could be made to have liquor permit of her husband, Lester DeLapp, revoked, if he has any permit, or an order entered that he be not granted such a permit.

Hearing in the matter is set for 2 o'clock Thursday, August 8. In her petition, Mrs. DeLapp stated that DeLapp drinks alcoholic liquor to excess and that when he is badly intoxicated he becomes such a condition that he loses all reasoning.

DeLapp stated in court that he had no liquor permit and vowed he would mend his ways. Pending the hearing, he was released on his own recognizance.

SILVERTON, Aug. 2.—(Special)—Agreement to sell the Fischer Flouring Mills back to its original owner, L. H. Fischer, provided he raises the required first payment, was reached by the stockholders at a meeting here tonight. Most of the larger stockholders were present. Fischer hopes to complete the deal in two weeks, and to reopen the mill, closed since May, 1932, specializing in patent cereals.

PIONEER'S FUNERAL TODAY AT STATYON

STATYON, Aug. 2.—Funeral services for Mrs. Phoebe Jane Burson, who came to Oregon by ox-cart in 1851, will be held in Statyon this afternoon. She was a resident of Statyon from 1872 until 1921 when she moved to Portland.

Her family on arrival in the northwest stopped in Vancouver, Wash., for a short time, then moved to a farm near Parkersville. When she was seven years old they moved to Sublimity, where she attended school. She lived later for about five years in Dallas. She was married in 1867 to Seth H. Burson, who preceded her in death in 1917.

Eight daughters and five sons were born to Mrs. Burson, of whom survive Mrs. Ella Williams, Mrs. Stella Hofeldt, Mrs. Loren Sanderson of Portland; Mrs. Rose Bell of Seattle; Mrs. Alda Murphy of Statyon; Morton S. Burson of Aumsville; Reinold L. Burson of Chiloquin, and William Preston Burson of Orchards, Wash. There are 21 grandchildren and 15 great grandchildren.

Mrs. Burson enjoyed good health and was quite active until shortly before her death. She was a member of the Church of God and lived a devoted Christian life.

484 Given Jobs At Agency Here In July, Report

Four hundred eighty-four men and women secured jobs through the national re-employment agency here during July, Lols Barker, district statistician, announced yesterday. Of these all but seven were Marion county residents.

The agency found work within the county for 411 men and 58 women and received calls from other re-employment offices in the state for 15 others.

The end of the month found the agency with names of 3655 men and 321 women desiring jobs, or 646 more than at the start of the month. Sixty-one of the persons sent to work were war veterans.

Governor Meier appointed Kellaher state parole officer September 5, 1931, to succeed Charles P. Pray, who was made superintendent of state police.

At one time Kellaher achieved widespread publicity, much of it unfavorable, for his political activity under the guise of the housewives' council of Portland.

WATER BOARD NOW IN TOTAL CONTROL

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CITY OUGHT TO PAY FOR SITE IS CLAIM

Three State Solons Insist Other Towns Willing to Pay for Privilege

While the present site may not be large enough for a new capitol, the cost of securing more adequate grounds should be borne by the citizens of Salem.

Such is the view of James Eckersley of Oswego and of Charles Leach and Lew Wallace of Portland, all members of the 1935 regular legislative session, expressed in a public letter released yesterday. Wallace, a member of the state game commission, may not return to the special session since
