

MARTIN ADVICE URGED BY GILL

State Grange Master Agrees
With Governor on
District Law

SILVERTON, Aug. 5. — "The government has quarrelled with me several times," declared Ray Gill, state grange master, who was the speaker at the Marion county Pomona picnic at the Silvertown park Sunday. "If you disagree with the governor," Gill continued, "he takes out his sword. The governor will have to take it on the chin like I do." Gill advised his audience to abide by the governor's advice for once, however, and vote a district law in connection with proper distribution of Bonneville power throughout the state.

Gill complained of the editorials and the press in general. He deplored the state recognition of gambling and other "vices" as bad examples for the 4-H boys and girls, especially. He advocated that the nation take over the banks and run them, that the speaker advised the people to "Arise from their tomato boxes on which they were calmly sitting, watching the parade go by" and get busy in spreading a wave of cooperation over the United States to bring about needs for the same happiness of the masses in the "on-trial-program of America of the past few years."

Strikes at Utilities
Gill concluded his talk by listing the three most tremendous forces adversely influencing American life today, whether economic, political or educational, as power utilities, transportation utilities and the banking interests.

During the forenoon, Rev. H. C. Leavenworth, retired minister of Puget Sound district of the Methodist church, delivered a sermon.

A vocal chorus with Mrs. W. F. Green of Turner at the piano, sang selections at both afternoon and forenoon programs. J. O. Farr of Ankeny announced the numbers during the morning session and Mrs. Olive Dallas of the Red Hills grange, presided during the afternoon. Other musical numbers furnished were a piano solo by Lucille Tschantz, a vocal selection by Marjorie Tate of Union Hills, readings by Harry Martin of Macleay grange.

Announcement was made of the state grange conference to be held as an all-day and evening affair at Macleay grange, September 20.

The 79th birthday on July 26 of George Bernard Shaw, famous Shavian dramatist, wit and philosopher, brings him one year closer to the century mark. His health and activity have continued unaffected by the passing years, due in part to his rigorous exercise and vegetarian diet. Shaw was born in Dublin in 1856, wrote his first play in the late 80's, and produced it in 1892. In 1898 he married Charlotte Payne-Townsend. His last visit to United States was in 1933 when he toyed with the idea of entering movies but eluded producers at Hollywood where he was a guest of Marion Davies, movie star.
