INDIA MISSIONARY WILL PREACH HERE

A series of illustrated gospel sermons depicting his experiences and trials as a missionary in India for the past 25 years will be opened by Rev. A. I. Garrison tonight at 7:45 o'clock at the Alliance gospel tabernacle, 655 Ferry street.

Rev. Garrison, who has served in the foreign mission field under the Christian missionary alliance banner, will speak each night this week and Sunday night, August 12, at the tabernacle at 7:45 o'clock. Damage by Fires In July Listed On City Report

Two houses and three private garages were badly damaged by five of 36 fires to which the Salem

fire department responded last month, Assistant Chief William Iwan announced yesterday. One of the fires, in a house at 1554 Ferry street, caused by a kerosene stove explosion, injured one man, an occupant. The other house fire occurred at 1906 Center street. A grass blaze in the 900 block, Columbia street, caused the destruction of one of the three garages. Two automobiles were badly damaged by another of the garage blazes, this at the W. W. Rossbraugh residence, 1422 State street.

Of the 36 alarms received, the central station crew responded to 19, the north station to six, east station to seven and south station four last month.
