Housing Chief Here—Residents of Marion county who desire information pertaining to the better housing program will be given the opportunity to learn all about it this week. J. H. Hoppes, field representative of the federal housing administration, will spend three days in Salem for the purpose of giving this information to persons interested in the building of new homes or in other phases of the program. He will make his headquarters at the Hotel Senator, where he will welcome the opportunity to explain what the housing organization is striving to accomplish in the way of improving housing conditions. Mr. Hoppes will be at the Senator Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

Bike Thrice Hit—Clarence S. Frey, 15, who lives at 754 South 13th street, yesterday reported to police that a bicycle he was riding was struck three times. He averred a car driven by H. D. Watson, 1924 North Commercial street, struck it first, knocking it against a truck, which in turn knocked it against an auto which was being backed out from the curb. Frey received minor bruises. Watson blamed the mishap on the truck, whose driver was not identified. A minor collision involving Clyde A. Gibbons, Monmouth, and an unidentified woman motorist, on the Center street river bridge, also was reported yesterday.

May Draw Mileage—County judges and commissioners who live at a distance from county seats, may draw mileage to and from their homes to the courthouse, in the discretion of the county court. Attorney General Van Winkle held Tuesday. Van Winkle said this did not mean that mileage should be paid for day trips, but only in cases where the county courts convene occasionally to transact county business. In a previous opinion Van Winkle held that payment of this mileage was prohibited. The opinion was requested by Ben C. Flaxel, district attorney of Coos county.

Devers' Plans Incomplete—J. M. Devers, attorney for the state highway commission, said last night he had not completed plans for the 24-apartment colonial bungalow court which he proposes to have built on the south side of State street east of 14th. "We plan on an attractive building but are not far enough along to say much about it yet," Devers stated. An architect has been employed to draft the plans. An ordinance will be before the city council on final passage August 19 granting a change from zone one to zone two to enable the Devers project to be carried out.

No Fire Wanted—"I haven't any fire, don't want any," city firemen yesterday afternoon quoted Carol Robinson as saying when they slid to a stop in front of Robinson's store at Hoyt and High streets. An unidentified person had telephoned the central fire station that Robinson's store was afire. "Hurry out, she's sure going."

FLAX PROGRAM IN VALLEY PROPOSED

Plants at Canby, Mt. Angel and Stayton Visioned; Towns Must Help

A committee to be composed of seven members will be appointed by Governor Martin later this week to handle the proposed flax development program in the Willamette valley, he announced Tuesday.

The governor's decision followed an announcement in Portland Monday that E. J. Griffith, head of the WPA in Oregon, had obtained permission of the federal government for the establishment of flax plants in this state. Griffith suggested that three rather than five plants should be projected at the outset.

The proposed locations of the plants are at Canby, Stayton and Mt. Angel. A processing plant would be retained at the state penitentiary. The cost of the three plants was estimated at \$75,000.

Governor Martin said that while the federal government would provide the necessary labor and some of the materials, other materials and the sites would have to be furnished by the communities in which the plants were located. He declared that the state would not be able to contribute any funds without a special act of the legislature.

The governor indicated that L. L. Laws, superintendent of the state flax plant; Mrs. W. W. Gabriel, E. G. Robinson and Walter W. R. May, all of Portland, would be made members of the committee. May is manager of the Portland chamber of commerce.

Corbett Will Be Governor While Martin in North

Governor Martin announced Tuesday that he would leave here later in the week for Olympia and Bremerton, Wash. At Olympia he will visit with Governor Martin of that state. The governor will remain several days at Bremerton visiting at the home of his son-in-law and daughter, Captain and Mrs. Schuyler Pyne.

Governor Martin then will accompany members of the state highway commission on a road inspection tour of eastern and southern Oregon. During his absence from the state Henry L. Corbett, president of the state senate, will be governor.

MORE WPA TASKS CONSIDERED HERE

Total Now 61; Three Marion County Jobs Included in Latest Group

Twenty-seven additional proposed projects for counties in district three, WPA, were submitted Saturday night by James E. Smith, district director with headquarters here. The list, bringing to 61 the total approved by this office and sent on for state and national action, includes three Marion county projects.

The 61 projects submitted to date represent about 5000 man months of labor, or in other words would, if all approved, give work to 5000 more for more than a month, engineers state.

The list submitted includes: Relief cannery, McMinnville; water system, Carlton, Yamhill county; distribution clerk for commodities center, Yamhill county relief commission, McMinnville; traffic check of 24 central points on the highway with the state highway department, McMinnville; road construction clearing and burning, Toledo, Lincoln county; constructing new county roads, Toledo, Lincoln county.

Road Work Included

Building one-half mile of trail east from the north end of Dale street to the school grounds, Toledo; landscaping at University of Oregon, Eugene; flood control, McMinnville; reservoir at Sheridan, Yamhill county; building 6700 feet of Parratt mount road from Carrel creek road to end of rock road, McMinnville; supervision of relief gardens, McMinnville.

Public cemetery, Lincoln county; determination of soil moisture, Marion county; state library, Marion county; street signs, Tillamook City; crushing rock on Big Nestucca river, Tillamook; Salem public library; widening of one mile of county road near Rose Lodge in Lincoln county; widening of Bear creek road near Toledo, Lincoln county; construction of roadway and dam at Waldport, Lincoln county.

Rev. Andrew Gih of Bethel Mission, Shanghai, China, will stop here Thursday en route to San Francisco. He will speak in the English language at 8 o'clock at the local Y.M.C.A. upstairs. Mr. Gih is the chairman of the world-wide evangelistic band with headquarters in Shanghai. He was pastor of the Bethel Mission Chinese church in Shanghai for 10 years and later labored in practically every province of China in evangelistic work. He will tell of the moral and spiritual awakening in the orient since the days of the Nestorians.

Mr. Gih comes to Salem at the invitation of Rev. A. J. Smith. Rev. Smith and wife were missionaries in China themselves for seven years. The public is invited to hear Rev. Gih.
