Road Bids Postponed—The special meeting of the state highway commission, scheduled for August 29 in Portland, to award \$1,500,000 of contracts under the federal highway aid program, has been postponed. It was announced here yesterday. The meeting probably will be held two weeks later. R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, said. The reason for the delay was the inability of the federal public roads bureau to prepare its specifications before bids would have to be advertised.

KUHN EXPENSE FUND UPHELD BY FUHRER

Attention to City Duties, Heavy Demands and Savings Cited

An itemized statement of the expense to which Mayor V. E. Kuhn has been put in carrying out his official duties, particularly in successfully negotiating with water company officials to secure the water system for the city, would be difficult to compile but he nevertheless was entitled to all of the \$700 expense money voted him by the city council Monday night, Alderman Walter Fuhrer, chairman of the public utilities committee, declared yesterday. "I believe Mayor Kuhn's duties have been more onerous than those of any previous Salem executive," Fuhrer said. "He has had to oversee completion of the water deal, he has given quite thorough supervision of the activities of city departments, has shared in the work of rebonding a large amount of city debt at lower interest rates, all in addition to daily demands on his time at his shop and numerous calls for his presence as the city's official representative at civic meetings and conventions."

Hires Extra Man
"His expenses for transportation, hotel bills and long distance phone calls have necessarily been large, due to the many conferences required with attorneys and officials of the water company. In fact, his duties for the city have necessitated his hiring one extra workman at his shop at \$100 per month so that he could give proper attention to city matters." Fuhrer also called attention to the fact that on the days the mayor attempts to spend at work in his shop, he must stop many times a day to talk to visitors who have problems to present.

Savings Pointed Out
"If Mayor Kuhn's expenses entailed by official duties could be totaled, I am sure they would far exceed the \$700 we paid him Monday night," Fuhrer said in concluding. "He has helped us save many times over that amount for the city."

The \$700 appropriation was approved without a dissenting vote. The mayor, as in the case of the aldermen, receives no salary from the city.

Governor, Road Leaders to Eye Eastern Oregon

The itinerary of the state highway commission, accompanied by Governor Martin, through eastern and southern Oregon, was announced yesterday by R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer. The officials will leave Salem September 9 and return September 15. The first day's stops will include Portland, Arlington and Pendleton. The remainder of the itinerary follows: Enterprise and Wallowa lake, September 10; Imnaha gorge and La Grande, September 11; Pendleton, September 12; Canyon City and Burns, September 13; Bend, September 14, and McKenzie pass, September 15.

Field Day Slated For Friday, Both City Playgrounds

Friday afternoon starting at 2 o'clock both Leslie and Olinger playgrounds will stage a field day with racing events for boys and girls of all ages. There will be three prizes in each division, making a total of 120 prizes. Contests will include 50-yard dash, shoe race, potato race, egg-spoon race and three-legged race.

Tourist Travel is Highest in Oregon Since 1930—Snell

Tourist travel in Oregon reached its peak during July for any month since 1930, Secretary of State Snell declared yesterday. The June registration was 14,720. The total 1935 registration to August 1 was 53,327 as compared with 51,277 for the same period in 1934. More than half of the out-state cars were from California and Washington. Idaho was third. California was first with 11,769 cars and Washington second with 2674 registrations. Idaho registered 556 cars. Approximately 665 cars were registered from Canada.

Harvest of Canning Peaches is Started

GRAND ISLAND, Aug. 7.—Rochester canning peach harvest is in full swing in all local orchards and the fruit is high grade. The peaches were hand-thinned last spring in most acreages in this locality.

SANE THINKING IS DR. REED'S THEME

Woman Instructor Declares Fresher Outlook Need, Social Problems

Social reform should be preceded by sane, analytical thinking, was the theme of a penetrating address of Dr. Dorothy Reed of the University of Kansas City before the Rotary club Wednesday. Miss Reed with the deftness of a surgeon laid open the social disorganization of the day, its economic maladjustment of want in the midst of plenty, its group conflicts, its crime prevalence, its family loosening as shown by high divorce rate and the controls of religion.

Men Values Needed
In particular she scoffed at recovery as merely a means for regaining possession of material goods. We need a new measure of value, she said, because the conception is wrong that possession of things means security. While the cry is for economic security we need also thinking stability, fresher mental outlook, and a revaluation of our ideas about work and life.

Deplored the intolerance which shows up in the group conflict she attributed prejudices to a lack of understanding, and described the narrowness which results in group and class and race and national antagonisms.

"Men cannot live by bread alone," she quoted. "He must live by thought as well as things. We have developed machines of precision to the thousandth part of an inch. We need human beings equally honest as our machines. We should refuse to surrender to the inertia or despair of the times, but should undertake to solve our problems by thinking them through and by intelligent cooperation. We should live and help live."

Miss Reed is visiting at her home in Portland for the summer. In the fall she begins work as associate professor of sociology at Principia college, St. Louis. Her father and mother and two friends accompanied her here from Portland. While here they called on Mr. and Mrs. Harry V. Collins, old family friends.

Shortage of other berry crops was given as the reason for the big blackberry pack anticipated.

Cooter said evergreen picking would start about September 25 on the coast and about September 15 in the Willamette valley.
