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## ICE CREAM CODE TO BE RULED ON SOON

### Briefs All In; Delegation Of Authority Illegal, Meyer Contends

All briefs in the case against Fred Meyer, Portland chain store operator, involving the constitutionality of the state agricultural adjustment act, have been filed in the state supreme court.

The law previously was held unconstitutional by Circuit Judge, Winters of Multnomah county. The suit originally was filed to restrain Meyer from selling ice cream at a price under the code quotation. Under Judge Winters' decision Meyer must comply with the code prices pending disposition of the appeal in the supreme court. Meyer contends that the code was formed by manufacturers and distributors and that it raised the price of ice cream from 29 to 40 cents a quart.

**Denies Farmer Benefited**  
"The farmer received only one cent of the increase," the brief filed by Meyer's attorneys read. "The Oregon state agricultural adjustment act is a flagrant violation of the constitutional requirement of a separation of legislative and executive powers and is an unconstitutional attempt to delegate powers not possessed by the legislature under the guise of market agreements."

"If this type of legislation is sustained the legislature could meet, delegate all its powers to interested groups and adjourn forever." The case already has been argued in the supreme court and a decision probably will be handed down late in September.
