## DAHL REPORTS ABOUT PARKING

**Council Also Hears Protest on Hauling Logs Over Second Street**

SILVERTON, Aug. 13.—The parking problem at Silverton on Saturday night has become a real one, according to the report Chief of Police Arthur Dahl made to the city council Monday night. Traffic becomes congested on Main street at times, he said, and double parking is a continuous practice. However, Mr. Dahl said, the double parkers were not the real offenders as most often they were shoppers who had to double park to get their purchases into their cars.

The real offenders, Mr. Dahl explained, were the people who came to town Saturday night, chose one of the most busy sections, parked their automobile and sat in it from 7 to 9 watching the traffic. Mr. Dahl also complained of those who made the city streets a garage and parked their cars there all day long. No definite action on the matter was taken.

**No Airport Funds**  
In a letter to the city recorder, George Custer from the works progress administration, Silverton, is informed no funds have been allocated for airport work in Oregon.

A communication from M. G. Gunderson asked for reimbursement of funds to Tom Ballantyne, recreational adviser, for money expended for equipment at the park playground. The request was granted.

**Application for liquor licenses** to George Manolis and Percy Byers was granted.

**Dislike Log Haul**  
A petition from owners of property along Second street, protesting the hauling of logs over that street, brought out considerable discussion. The home owners along this street contended that the trucks, hauling the large logs, broke the pavement and water main along the street. Mayor E. W. Garver explained that the trucks had been given permission to haul and their road through the city had been routed as it was because it seemed the most logical way. The mayor also said he had been unable to discover any damage done to the streets. The police had notified the drivers that they must not travel over 15 miles an hour either going or coming, with or without logs, in the city. The matter was left in the hands of the street committee for investigation.

Strangers at Silverton will be directed by new street signs in the very near future, according to action taken Monday night. Approximately 125 signs will be used at street intersections.

**Seek Non-Skid Top**  
Putting non-skid top dressing on some of the corners within the Silverton city limits was discussed. Mayor Garver promised to take care of this. Fixing the approaches to bridges within Silverton was also brought up and discussed.

Dangerous sidewalks and trapdoors were reported upon by Chief Dahl with the result that owners of such are to be notified.

The request that the Silverton fire department be permitted to sponsor the appearance of the Browning Amusement company at Silverton was denied. Council members felt that the company should pay its license fee if it desired to give an entertainment in Silverton.

**Malheur Decision**  
Whether the state of Oregon will go any farther in defense of the suit brought by the federal government against the state of Oregon, to obtain title to the beds and waters of Malheur, Mud and Harney lakes, is a question that will be referred to the next legislature.

This was indicated Tuesday when the state land board instructed the secretary of state to pay no more claims in this litigation. Officials said the 1933 legislature appropriated \$18,000 for the defense of the suit, and that already the sum had dwindled to \$531. Other claims aggregating \$10,827.10 are outstanding and unpaid. The records show that more than \$9500 has been paid for the salary and expenses of L. A. Liljeqvist, assistant attorney general, who has handled the litigation for the state.

Members of the land board said they objected particularly to the payment of \$10,827.28, the state's share of the fee and disbursements of Garrett W. McEnerny, special master in the case. He was appointed by the federal court. The litigation was won by the federal government.

It was pointed out that some of the costs incurred by Liljeqvist were obligated prior to the legislative appropriation.

## First Shipment of Pears Comes Here

**Preliminary Price is Under That of Last Year; to Be Expensive Pack**

First shipment of pears for the season's run at the Salem cannery arrived on the tracks last night for Reid Murdoch and company, and, depending on the time required for ripening, first pear operations at this plant will get under way the middle or last of next week.

The initial pears coming in here were bought in Washington at \$25 per ton, which price is about \$5 less than last year's figure. Cannery here are of the opinion that before the season has progressed far the price will be under the \$25 figure, as evidenced by the fact that only one or two local canners have entered buying at all, and that for only their early orders.

While the California crop is shorter than last year and the northwest pear harvest will be only 85 to 90 per cent of last year's bumper crop, there is a comparatively heavy carryover of the 1934 pear pack, which has kept the canners' offers to growers down.

As usual, the pear pack in the major Salem cannery will be one of the largest of the season again this year. Automatic Pear Packer will be in operation in the plants again this season, as these effect a more uniform canned product as well as doing faster work and bringing some economy in spite of high royalties.

Canning of evergreen blackberries is just getting a fair start in local canneries this week and will last for some time. The pear run will continue all through September and most of October, if usual conditions hold.

At the Reid Murdoch and company plant, evergreen blackberries, pears, prunes for canning and the fruit cocktail product and maraschino cherry pack will keep the cannery in operation from now until late in the year.

A top of three cents a pound has been paid so far this season on cultivated evergreen blackberries and 2 1/2 cents is the best figure paid for wild evergreens.
