

HOPSON ENTERS SENATE PROBE

Tells of Attempts to Make Newspapers Switch Over on Utilities Bill

Investors and then had editorial writers that had so little knowledge of the situation about which they were writing.

"The long and short of it is that you tried to see about stopping the ads or changing their editorial policy," Black persisted.

"I told them to see the people of the New York Times, and try to explain our problem," Hopson said.

Increasing Ads to Halt Opposition Suggested

Black brought out that Hopson had suggested advertising in the Hearst papers be increased because they opposed the utilities bill.

Hopson also made suggestions, he conceded after questioning that efforts be made to have papers "switch over," including those of the Scripps-Howard chain.

As Hopson's testimony continued, it was learned that house lobby committee "bodyguards" had just released him at his hotel after the utilities man and his lawyer talked by telephone with Chairman O'Connor (D-N.Y.).

"The senate would never have gotten him if we hadn't turned him loose," O'Connor said.

Earlier, an understanding had been reached that the senate committee might question Hopson at such times as the house committee did not require his attendance.

So noisy and unusual had been the quarrel between the two branches, however, that surprise was occasioned earlier in the day by an announcement by Hopson's attorney that he would come before its committee.

high school building, will probably be made immediately.

Forcy A. Cupper, recently elected member of the board, who is a consulting engineer by profession, was appointed by Chairman Minier as an additional member of the building committee to aid in consultations on the plans. Frequent conferences of the architects, Superintendent Silas Gaiser and the building and grounds committee will be held in the next several weeks for preparation of the preliminary plans.

The preliminary contract with the firm of McKnight and Howell, appointed for the high school job and as consulting architects for the entire program, with Lyle Bartholomew, appointed as architect for the Leslie additions, and Frank H. Struble, architect for the elementary school building, will be ready within the next week. The architects are gambling upon the approval of the school voters of the \$600,000 bond issue on which the proposed building program rests. The board will be under no obligation in case the voters turn down the bond issue.

HOPKINS TO SPEED WORK RELIEF, SAYS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Acceleration in the works relief program which he claimed has provided 602,000 jobs was reported today by Harry L. Hopkins.

After sending home works progress field directors with renewed instructions to end the dole by November 1, Hopkins:

1. Denied the prediction by Senator McCarran (D-Nev.) that the "spirit" of the prevailing wage would be set up on the \$19 to \$94 works progress scale.
2. Transients to CCC
3. Declared all transients able to work and otherwise eligible would be enlisted in the civilian conservation corps or given jobs by other work relief agencies.
4. Estimated that \$1,900,000, 000 already allotted for work relief projects—including \$175, 000,000 in WPA programs—would employ 1,573,000 persons, leaving \$2,100,000,000 for the remaining 1,925,000 while WPA applications total \$72,000,000.
5. Joined with Secretary Ickes in seeking to make clear the difference between public works and works progress projects and in warning communities not to leave WPA for better terms with Hopkins' agency.

VISALIA, Cal., Aug. 15.—(AP)—The infantile paralysis epidemic here claimed its fifth victim tonight with the death of Truman Smith, 20, Mrs. Walter Rockborn, 39, who died today, was the fourth to succumb. Nine others remain stricken with the disease.

Zucchini Weenie
Wash 5 or 6 small zucchini (Italian squash) and hollow out the insides. This can be done by cutting off one end and using apple corer or the squash may be split lengthwise and hollowed out with a spoon. In the latter case, the halves may be held together with tooth picks. Stuff each zucchini with a wienner or small pork sausage—the sausage should first be browned in a skillet, and placed in a saucepan. Pour over them one can tomato soup, add seasonings to taste and simmer until tender.

Squash Butter
6 lbs. squash
5 lbs. sugar, light brown
5 lemons
2 tablespoons ground ginger
2 tablespoons ground cinnamon
1 teaspoon salt
1 pint water
Peel squash, chop the pulp or put it through the food chopper. Add spices and sugar together with lemon juice and rind put through chopper. Let stand overnight. In morning add 1 pint water and boil gently until vegetable is clear and soft and mixture is thick. Pour boiling hot in sterilized jars and seal.

AAA Injunction Denied, Federal Court of Appeal

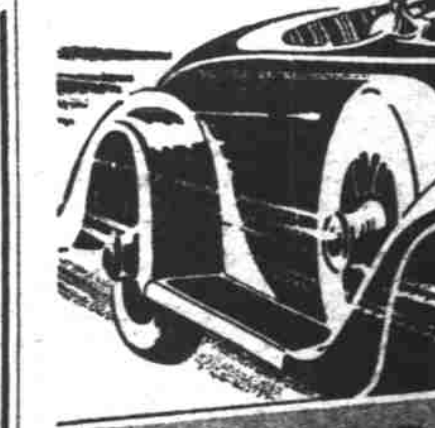
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 15.—(AP)—The ninth United States circuit court of appeals declined today, temporarily at least to interfere with the payment of AAA processing taxes by milling companies in the state of Washington.

The tribunal having jurisdiction in seven western states, denied a temporary restraining order sought by the milling companies to prevent the government from collecting the tax. The court ruled that the showing by the milling companies was insufficient to warrant a restraining writ.

Jack London Film Of Notrh is Held Over at Elsinore

Realism was the object of the 20th Century unit's location trip to sub-zero Mt. handicap to President Roosevelt's financial program.

Adopted 49 to 39 on the motion of Senator Borah (R-Idaho) this amendment would prohibit future issues of tax-exempt federal securities. Treasury officials said immediately that, if accepted by the house, the amendment would place the government at a disadvantage, since states and municipalities would continue to enjoy the tax-free privilege on their securities.

Aside from handicapping a heavy borrowing program ahead to finance the \$4,000,000,000 work-relief program, officials said the Borah amendment would increase the cost of all money obtained by the government. President Roosevelt had recommended a constitutional amendment to permit taxing all governmental securities, federal, state and local.

Parts which the other five officials assertedly played in upholding the governor's move resulted in their being included in the resolution.

The labor delegates pledged themselves to "further and continued resistance to the end that this state shall be a state governed by law, administered by officials who observe the sacredness of their oath of office, who place human rights above property rights, and who know the meaning of democratic government."

Recommendation for the unionization of teachers was passed after considerable discussion on a resolution presented by May Darling, representative of a teachers' organization.

Midget Coin Plan Killed by House; New Dollar Bill

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—(AP)—with its chairman contending the supreme court would not uphold the attorney general's contention that state coinage of sub-penny sales tax pieces was illegal, the house coinage committee today killed the midget coin bill.

The committee voted, 9 to 1, to table the legislation requested by the administration, for this session at least.

Youthful Seattle Race Driver Dies In Crash on Turn

SEATTLE, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Roaring around a turn on the Olympic View speedway tonight, two racing automobiles crashed, one of them overturning and pinning its driver beneath it.

Elmer Lindskog, 18, Seattle, the driver, was dragged unconscious from under his car and taken to a hospital where attendants said they did not believe his injuries were dangerous.

The other car, driven by R. Ernstrom, Portland, swerved and skidded into the infield. Ernstrom was unhurt.

METHODISTS NEAR MERGER AGREEMENT

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Bishops and laymen representing the three principal branches of the Methodist church tonight were near agreement on a constitution by which, if adopted, their organizations would be merged into a unified church.

Meeting in suburban Evanston to adopt a program for submission to the general conferences of the three divisions, the delegates had before them only two major problems, they said.

One was selection of a judicial system by which a "supreme court" would check the constitutionality of any action taken by a general conference provided for in plans for the merger.

The other was subdivision of the proposed unified Methodist church into regional or jurisdictional conferences. Leaders were hopeful that both questions would be settled before the conference here was ended.
