He is a trader and operates a whaling station nearby.

Wiley Carried Siberian Passport
The tragedy ended a pleasure jaunt on which Post, himself carrying a passport for a projected flight to Siberia, had been piloting Rogers throughout Alaska, the Yukon and northwest territories of Canada.

It occurred during the height of the short arctic summer—Barrow is more than 300 miles inside the arctic circle, at the end of Alaska's northernmost point. Even yet, Barrow's "harbor" in the Arctic ocean roadstead is open only at intervals to shipping and the coast guard cutter Northland is held in the ice pack off Wainwright, 75 miles southwest of here, after her annual visit there.

On orders from coast guard headquarters at Washington, D. C., the Northland was battling the ice pack today en route back to Barrow.

The Northland radioed that her arrival time at Barrow is "very indefinite because conditions are unfavorable."

Barrow Has Dozen White Residents
Barrow itself is a tiny spot of civilization on the end of Point Barrow, inhabited by about a dozen white persons, and several hundred natives.

Post had crossed Alaska twice, on both his round-the-world flights.

Oklahoma State Capitol Offered For Will's Rites

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Governor E. W. Marland telegraphed Mrs. Will Rogers today, offering the use of Oklahoma's state capitol for the body of her husband to lie in state.

"If you are going to bury Will in Oklahoma, the people of Oklahoma would appreciate the privilege of showing their respect, and I tender the use of the state capitol at whatever day and hour you choose for the body to lie in state," the wire read. "The flag on the state capitol is now flying at half mast, with deepest sympathy."

Julius Meier Is Shocked, Tragedy

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 16.—(AP)—Former Governor Julius Meier was shocked when informed today by The Associated Press of the fatal crash in Alaska of Wiley Post and his airplane passenger, Will Rogers.

The filer's widow leaves by motor car tomorrow morning for Oklahoma City, where she will take a plane for Seattle, arriving there probably some time Sunday.

Mrs. Helen McSpadden Eaton, niece of Rogers, said she probably will be buried in California.

"Mother said she thought the burial probably would be in California," she said. "That was his home, you know, and one of the boys is buried there."

The humorist's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clem Rogers, are buried at Chelsea, Okla.

Jews Get German Trade by Reason Of Good Service

BERLIN, Aug. 16.—(AP)—The official Nazi party economic press service frankly warned merchants today that the campaign against Jewish business firms may fail if Gentile stores do not improve their service.

In a communication to Aryan firms the service said: "Do not think numerous Germans make their purchases at Jewish shops merely from meanness or childish obstinacy." It pointed out that "other considerations enter" and advised adoption of the American principle "the customer is always right."
