It is difficult to visualize the population and growth of our state 100 years hence. But it is a most important issue. With these two vital points of interest I can think of no other location more suitable and more beautiful than the Willamette university campus. Centrally located, a historic landmark, near the old capitol, extensive grounds with lovely background of enormous trees, practically level ground with minimum cost of grading, surrounded by parks and a striking setting upon approaching the city — are just a few remarks that are in favor of this choice that has been mentioned so many times by many people.

"While I was traveling in the Orient last winter I met many people who had motored through Oregon. All praised its natural beauty. When they learned Salem was my residence, everyone remarked about our lovely central park and exclaimed that our city was one of the most beautiful and pleasant of any for its size in America. What we have, let us not destroy, but improve and beautify and cherish for the present and the future."

PILUSO TOE HOLDS WIN FROM M'SHAIN

INDEPENDENCE, Aug. 17. — Del Kunkle, Pacific coast middleweight champion, defended his title by taking the first two falls from Pug Ryan, Los Angeles Iron man, in the title wrestling match at the hop bowl Wednesday night.

Noel Franklin, wrestling instructor from Hill Military academy in Portland, took two straight falls in succession with body presses from Herb Bergeron of Portland.

Ernie Piluso, known over the valley as one of the best basketball referees, took the two last falls from Dan McShain, Hollywood Irishman, by toe holds. This was by far the most interesting match to spectators. The wrestlers got into a knee lock hold, out of which the referee had to help them by taking off a shoe. The wrestlers followed this by rough treatment of toe biting and choking with socks at each other.

The referee was Harry Elliott, popular wrestler with wrestling fans. Herb Owen of Portland, arranged the card.

The next big wrestling card to be staged in the hop bowl will be between Lord Lansdowne of London and the rough and tough Bulldog Jackson Thursday, August 29, at 8:30 p. m. Elmer E. Addison and Dr. George D. Herley, sport chairman, are making arrangements for the bout.

United Stage Line Given 3 Days Time

An extension of three days has been granted the United Stages system in removing its equipment from the highways of Oregon, south of Portland, according to E. A. Landis, superintendent of transportation in the state utilities department. The permit of the stage lines was canceled in an order of the public utilities commissioner for violating traffic regulations.

State police were notified yesterday of the extension and instructed to enforce the order after midnight Monday. The line will continue to operate stages from Portland north.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 17. — (AP) — Mrs. Wiley Post, widow of the famous flier killed Thursday with Will Rogers in Alaska, will receive \$250 monthly under a contract signed by Post at the time the Wiley Post Aircraft corporation was organized here with the globe circling as its head.

The contract made more than a year ago stipulated Mrs. Post would receive \$250 a month in event of Post's death. The contract is effective until November, 1936.

The first step in the advertising campaign to put the Willamette valley on the map has been achieved by the Greater Willamette Valley Association, Inc., in the production of what is considered the finest folder ever printed for the purpose of promoting the valley from the standpoint of its agricultural resources and advantages.

This folder, just off the press and ready for distribution, is printed in two colors and tells a most absorbing story of northwest Oregon's unexcelled climate, abundant diversity of crops, its fame in producing record-breaking dairy cows and poultry and its social and recreational advantages. In addition to the large number of glowing facts, interestingly set forth in the typewriter, 32 beautiful pictures are shown which emphasize the premium quality of the valley's fruits, nuts, vegetables, grains and livestock. Hunting, fishing and scenic views give a hint of the unequalled recreational diversions to be found here.

Air View Outstanding
The cover is particularly interesting because it shows an unusual air view of a sizeable section of the valley, with the Willamette river in the foreground. Orchards and fields alternating with clumps of fir trees, present a picture most characteristic of this beautiful "three million acre garden."

One page of the folder is devoted to brief mention of all towns in the valley from Portland on the north to Cottage Grove on the south, giving populations above 500 and setting forth features for which each community is particularly noted.

Another animating feature of

the folder is a large, two-color map showing the entire valley, dotted with towns and cities, interlaced with highways and streams, and surrounded by fire-covered mountains, with Mt. Hood, Mt. The folders will be used to answer inquiries received as a result of this advertising. Highway bulletins will also be erected at all entrances to the valley, as a means of identification and to create greater interest on the part of tourists and others traveling through daily.

A membership campaign is now being conducted throughout the valley to raise sufficient funds to carry the program through effectively. With many more inquiries coming in from people living in other states than ever before, the officers of the association are enthusiastic over the possibilities of their campaign as a means of bringing 25,000 to 50,000 new farmers and others with money to invest in Oregon and the Willamette valley.

3 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt

Beat egg thoroughly. Cream into it sugar, shortening and vegetable. Stir in the milk. Mix flour, baking powder and salt and add to mixture. Beat thoroughly. Pour into oiled muffin pans and bake for thirty minutes in a quick oven.

BRIGHT SPOTS SEEN IN WEEK'S TRADING

Stock Mart Continues Acting Along Bullish Lines; Utilities Hopeful

NEW YORK, Aug. 17. — (AP) — The stock market continued to respond to bullish reflexes in today's brief session and, despite the usual weekend realizing, many new highs for the year or longer were recorded.

Cheerful trade news and hopeful developments at Washington contributed to the better feeling which was evident in the boardrooms. What selling appeared was generally viewed as unimportant, and the majority of buyers were willing to bid up their favorites.

While gains were held down to relatively moderate proportions, renewed demand for the rails and utilities kept the list pointed upward during the two hours of trading. Many of the industrials were about unchanged to a bit easier, however, at the close.

The Associated Press average of 60 selected stocks moved up .2 of a point to 49.1, a new 1935 top. The utilities got up .4 to another new year's peak. The activity was not quite as pronounced as in last Saturday's proceedings, but transfers totaled 1,076,230 shares.

The utilities reflected hopefulness that the much disputed holding company bill would be lost in the shuffle along with a number of other controversial measures.

Factory Outputs Gain
Of interest to resurgent proponents was the Associated Press index of industrial activity which showed that an upturn in output of automobiles, steel and cotton goods more than offset seasonal declines in freight traffic and power production.

In addition, the W. W. Dodge corporation estimated building operations in July at the highest for any month since March, 1933. This week, Standard Statistics company reported, was the first week since the depression during which there was not a single unfavorable dividend change.

Bonds gave a good account of themselves. The carriers were the best. Among the best shares with gains of fractions to around a point were those of Santa Fe at 53 1/2, Central of New Jersey at 53 1/2, Erie at 13 1/2, Great Northern at 22 1/2, N. J. Central at 25 1/2, St. Louis Southwest at 12 1/2, Union Pacific at 10 1/2, Consolidated Gas at 33 1/2, Columbia Gas at 13 1/2, Public Service of New Jersey at 44 1/2, United Corp. at 6 1/2 and North American at 24.

Klamath Falls was named as the convention city for 1936. Delegate and alternate to the next American Federation of Labor meeting are Agnes Quinn, Portland waitress' union, and Mrs. L. Gies, Portland garment union, respectively.

\$6,625,258 Bet on Oregon Dog Races In Three Seasons

Oregon's share of receipts from greyhound races held in Portland this year aggregated \$76,118, according to announcement made by the state treasury department.

This represented the state racing commission's share (2 1/2 per cent) of the \$2,824,432 wagered on the dogs at the pari-mutuel windows and a per diem fee of \$18,000 for the season. The state fair, county fairs, Pendleton roundup, Pacific International Livestock exposition, and Douglas county turkey show will participate in the distribution of the fund.

In three seasons a total of \$6,625,258 has been wagered at dog races held in Oregon, the state treasurer's report showed.

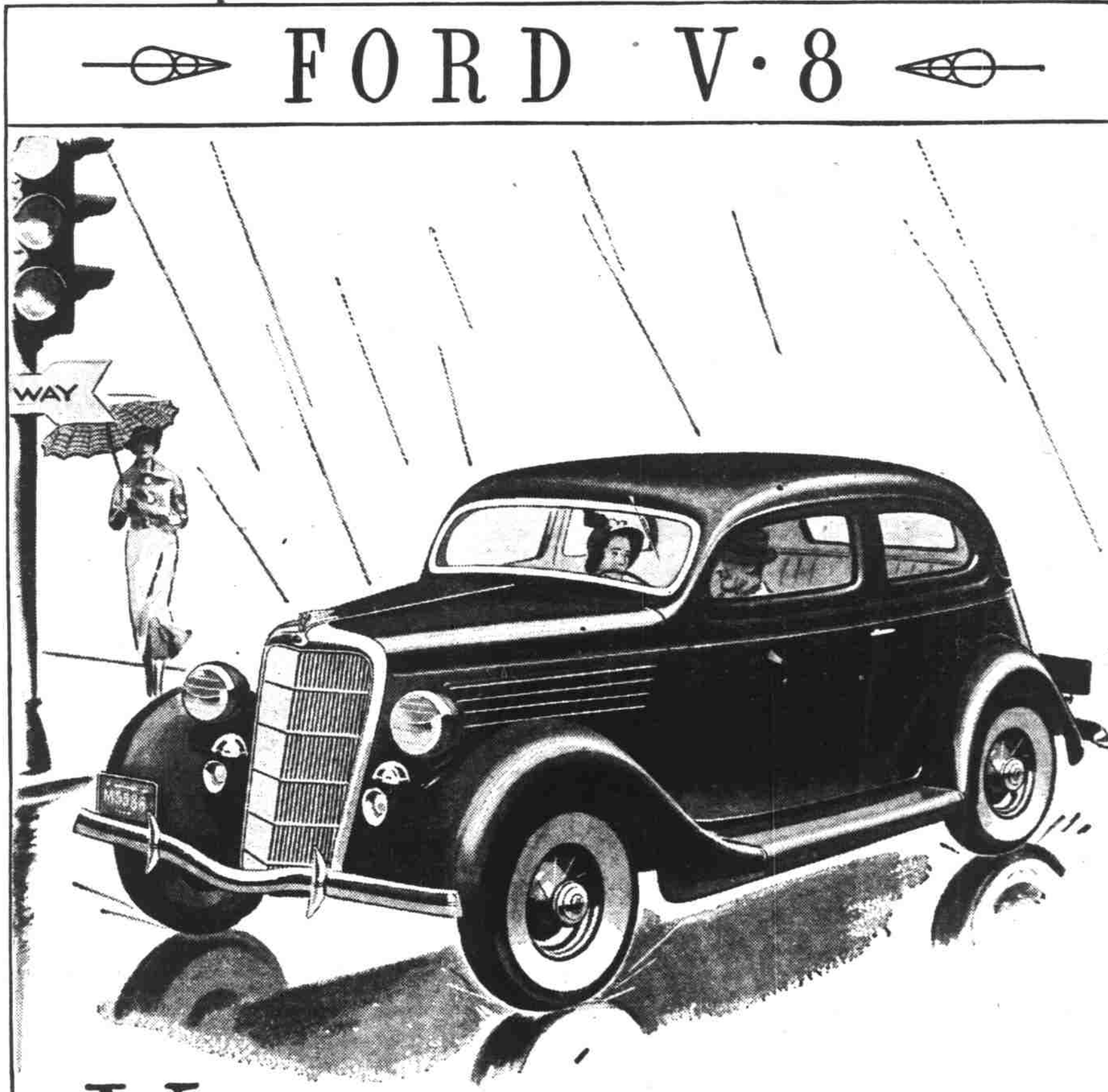
Cabby Suicides, Saying He Wants To Join Rogers

Nine Bombers Due To Arrive Today, Train at Medford

MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 17. — (AP) — Nine bombing planes of the United States army are scheduled to arrive here Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, for a week of bombing practice and aerial maneuvers in southern Oregon.

It has been unofficially announced that flights will be made during the week over the Siskiyou mountains, the Cascade range, and the Umpqua divide.

The bombing plane squadron will take off from Hamilton field, San Francisco, Sunday morning. A force of 30 officers and 100 enlisted men comprise the detail ordered here.

FIREPROOFING FOR PEN TO BE ASKED

PORTLAND, Aug. 17. — (AP) — Representative Ellis W. Barnes announced today he would introduce a bill at the pending special session of the state legislature calling for fireproofing of the state penitentiary.

"I hope that before Oregon suffers a national disgrace such as the Ohio prison holocaust the legislature will see fit to correct existing conditions," he said.

The representative, in commenting on Governor Martin's asserted intention to bar all bills except those pertaining to the proposed state capitol building, declared: "I don't see how he would dare veto this bill in the face of the hazard that now exists."

McMinnville Will Get Lumber Mill

McMINNVILLE, Ore., Aug. 17. — (AP) — R. W. Stevenson of Vancouver, Wash., today announced that as soon as a site is made available his company will construct a plant here, employing 50 men, to refinish lumber for eastern retail yards.

ITALY SAYS BLACKS RAIDED TRIBESMEN

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The British were impatiently waiting word from Premier Mussolini as to what he wanted, while the Italians insisted procedure was up to the French and English.

French officials explained a Franco-British plan was submitted for communication to Il Duce offering Italy certain concessions in Ethiopia. The Italians, however, denied that they were waiting for any word from Mussolini and insisted that no proposition had been submitted to them.

Waiting for Il Duce, Laval stated.

In contrast with this statement, Premier Pierre Laval of France said: "We are waiting for word from Mussolini."

The Italian spokesman said: "The Italian viewpoint on the Ethiopian question is well known and her ends in that country are also known. There is no reason for us to clarify our viewpoint."
