

Hope of Congress Adjournment This Week Growing Dim

INTER-HOUSE SNARLS WORRY

Senate Vote on Guffey Coal Bill Likely Today; Tax Bill Hanging Fire

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Despite rapid action in some quarters, congress became ensnarled today in a series of differences that threatened to delay adjournment until next week.

As the tangles developed, Speaker Byrnes, observed that "it looks like we'll be here until next Wednesday." Representative Snell of New York, the republican leader, expressed a similar opinion.

Senate Ready to Quit Tonight, Averred

On the senate side, however, Robinson of Arkansas, the democratic leader, asserted he was "ready to quit tomorrow night, provided some things are worked out tomorrow," but thought the drive should be directed toward a Friday adjournment. He promised to look personally into some of the deadlocks in search of quick agreements.

On both sides, the adjournment fever remained high, bringing these developments:

A conference agreement on a compromise TVA bill, designed to bulwark the Tennessee Valley Authority against local attacks, was approved swiftly by both the house and senate and sent to the White House.

Under the urge of European war scare headlines, the senate whipped through a seven-point neutrality bill, reversing long-established American policies.

Final Vote Today Is Due on Guffey Bill

The senate arranged for a final vote tomorrow on the Guffey coal stabilization bill, but added an amendment by Senator Borah (R-Ida.) that would clip from the house approved bill the provision that would exempt complying operators from the anti-trust laws.

Despite these positive activities, a bulky program labeled as "desire" by President Roosevelt, remained to be acted upon. Included in the pile was the \$250,000,000 tax bill, the Walsh labor standards bill, railroad pensions, utilities, liquor control, gold suit prohibition, and the Frazier-Lemke farm moratorium. All except the first were enmeshed in difficulties.

Tentative plans were laid to bring up the tax bill conference agreement in the house tomorrow. Should both branches endorse it as quickly as they did the TVA measure today, some privately expressed fears that an exodus of members might result that adjournment would be forced before other measures are acted upon.

President Takes Hand In Utilities Snarl

High up in the list of snarls was that surrounding the utilities bill. Before senate-house conference again failed to reach an agreement, drawing from managers of the two branches expressions of the bill might be dead for the session. With President Roosevelt taking a direct hand however, there were indications that a compromise proposal might be placed directly before the house and senate that would win agreement.

SHORTAGE OF HOP PICKERS IS ENDED

After a shortage of pickers Tuesday in hop yards near Salem, the demand had been practically filled yesterday, it was reported by Portland Wednesday morning.

About 100 workers were sent from the office to four yards and none came back or reported they were not needed.

A dozen or more pickers could be used today but the biggest unfilled demand was for bean pickers at West Stayton, the employment office reported. Forty bean pickers were wanted at closing time Wednesday. Several workers were sent to camp in the bean district last night.

Transient laborers inquired during the day Wednesday where they might obtain hop picking jobs and many of them were doubtless employed along side of local pickers, the employment officials said. Los Angeles was the most southern point and Seattle the most northern represented by the migratory workers.

Men Badly Needed

The men are badly needed to pick hops, blackberries and beans in the western Oregon and Columbia river districts, Cooter said. Wages, he declared, are higher than can be earned under the WPA.

Douglas Prune Growers Adhere To State Code

ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 21.—(AP)—Douglas county prune growers at a meeting here last night, voted unanimously in favor of continuing the state marketing agreement.

Basic prune harvesting and drying wages and charges were adopted. Under the agreement, commercial driers would handle Italian prunes on a basis of 1 1/2 cents a pound and French varieties at 1 cent a pound. Common labor, including shakers, traymen and sorters, would be paid 25 cents an hour. Pickers would receive 4 cents a box and an additional 1 cent for those who remain throughout the season.

At Claremore, Okla., which Rogers called "my home town," a memorial service at Will Rogers airport is expected to be attended by 12,000 persons. And at nearby Chelsea, the Rev. Argus J. Hamilton, classmate of Rogers in '96 at Neosho, Mo., will deliver the eulogy.

Full-British Cabinet Will Hear Key Men's Plans To Unite Dominion

government did everything but specifically ask the United States to give its full support to London's policy and by implication tried to hurry Washington into voluntarily stating its official views.

U. S. Representative Approached Formally

Ray Atherton, American charge d'affaires, had expected to be called in the foreign office tonight, but later went to the country without the British government making any formal approach on the question of American cooperation. The foreign office officially denied a report (not carried by the Associated Press) that Sir Samuel Hoare, foreign secretary, had appealed to the United States through Atherton.

The special meeting today in the prime minister's office, held in an atmosphere reminiscent of the meeting days of 1914, lasted two hours.

Malcolm MacDonald, son of the foreign premier, who acted as prime minister until Baldwin's arrival, declared the situation "is the most serious we have faced since 1914. It is a very grave situation."

That the government seeks to have support of the great empire was made clear as a result of a long special conference Hoare and Eden held with representatives of the five dominions.

The cabinet is studying whether to lift the ban on exports of arms to Ethiopia and Italy, with authoritative quarters hinting the ban will be lifted for both nations.

MOSCOW, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Belief

that war in Ethiopia would lead to complications involving other powers than Italy was expressed tonight in the official press.

Soviet Would Frown on War

No doubt was left by the tone of the inspired articles that the Soviet union would consider an Italo-Ethiopian war one of conquest and would heartily disapprove. The angle which created the keenest interest here was that of a possible weakening of Mussolini's position in Europe through a drain of troops and money for an African campaign.

BERLIN, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Germany's

attitude toward an Italo-Ethiopian conflict will be one of strict neutrality and disinterest, it was stated tonight in informed circles.

The Reich, it was reported reliably, will not send munitions to either nation.
