**Health Officer Reports**—A total of 1149 field trips during the first seven months of this year were made by the Marion county department of health. Dr. Vernon Douglas, county health officer, reported to the executive board. In July 117 visits were made, while 24 diphtheria immunizations and 31 smallpox immunizations were given. Twelve tuberculin tests were made out of the 113 visits made during this disease.

## N. DAKOTA CROPS ARE RUINED AGAIN

**BRUSH CREEK, Aug. 22.**—North Dakota wheat crops which gave such splendid promise last year and even in the middle of summer, just aren't, according to a letter received by Miss Althea Meyer from her cousin, Erna Doyen, who resides at Fargo. Miss Doyen has visited at the Meyer home, and once spent a summer here. Many still recall her.

"We had," writes Miss Doyen, "promise of one of the finest crops we had had in years, and that held until two weeks before harvest when black rust began to show up in fields of wheat. It rapidly spread so that at threshing time several fields weren't even cut, and the yields of others was almost nothing."

Miss Doyen tells further that while the wheat crop was practically ruined by the black rust, other crops turned out so well that "the farmers' spirits aren't entirely dashed to the ground."

## BOMBING SQUADRON MAKES VISIT HERE

Nine large bombing planes, forming the United States army's 31st bombing squadron, arrived here at 8:22 a. m. Thursday from Medford in charge of Major H. D. Smith. The planes have been engaged in maneuvers there for the past week. The trip to Salem was made in one hour and 22 minutes. Prior to landing at the local airport the planes circled above the state capitol grounds.

Squadron officials were welcomed by Brigadier-General Rilea, representing Governor Martin; Dave O'Hara, representing Mayor Kuhn; Earl Snell, secretary of state, and other officers.

The planes remained here less than an hour, during which time visitors at the field were allowed to inspect the equipment. Colonel C. L. Tinker, commanding Hamilton field, arrived here after the other planes had landed, and departed later for Seattle. More than 1000 persons were at the airport when the planes arrived.
