Mrs. Brooks is widely known throughout the Willamette valley, having made this his home for a number of years, later attending Willamette university.

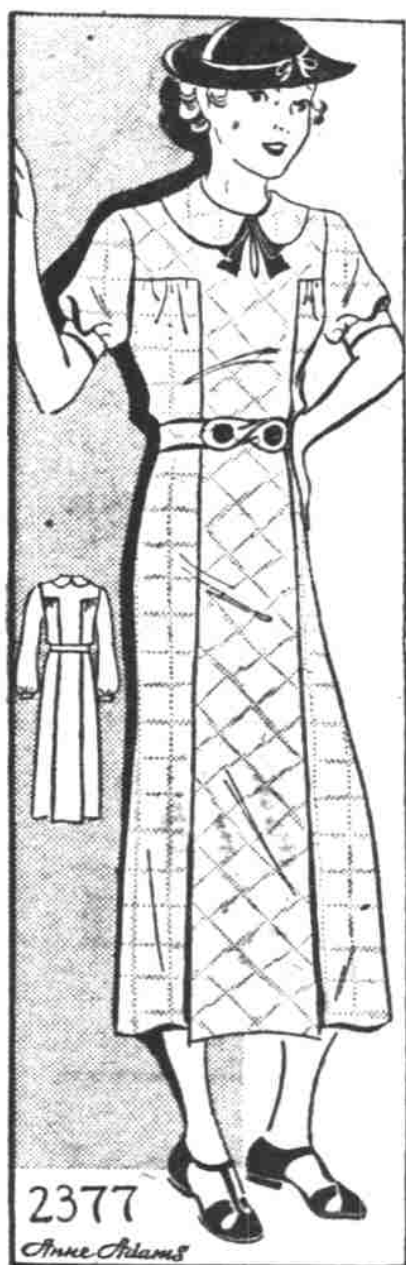
## Mrs. Ronald Jones is Luncheon Hostess

Salem flying enthusiasts have been invited en masse to attend the air circus at the big Hop Fiesta in Independence August 29 to 31. A full program of flying events is being arranged for the three-day affair.

## WILD STEERS HERE FOR RODEO AT FAIR

Big, lean and wiry, with the dust of Old Mexico still fresh in their nostrils, 25 wild Brahma steers are here for the Oregon state fair rodeo which will be held each evening in the horse show stadium, beginning Monday, September 2, third day of the fair.

The Brahmas are a cross between the sacred oxen of India and the native cattle of America. They were raised on the U. S. ranch, south of the Rio Grande, and are the same breed witnessed at the Pendleton Roundup and major rodeos in California.

Jack Millerton of Sonoma, Cal., is owner of the famous rodeo stock and cattle that will be seen in action at the state fair rodeo.

The best riders in the west will compete at the fair rodeo this year and already more than 30 famous riders have signed for the contest. Popular prizes will prevail with an ample number of boxes and reserved seats for those who care to reserve their seats in advance.

## CHIEF JOSEPH AIDE IN OLD WARS DIES

NESPELEM, Wash., Aug. 22.—(AP)—Yellow Wolf, one of the last of the warriors who rallied around the great Chief Joseph in his attempt to hold north Idaho hunting grounds 58 years ago, is dead. An exile from his land and his tribe, the Nez Perce, and more than 90 years old, Yellow Wolf died on his farm five miles from this town, in the Colville reservation. With the defeated Joseph and other warriors, Yellow Wolf was sent to this reservation after Joseph was captured in the Bear Paw mountains on October 4, 1877.

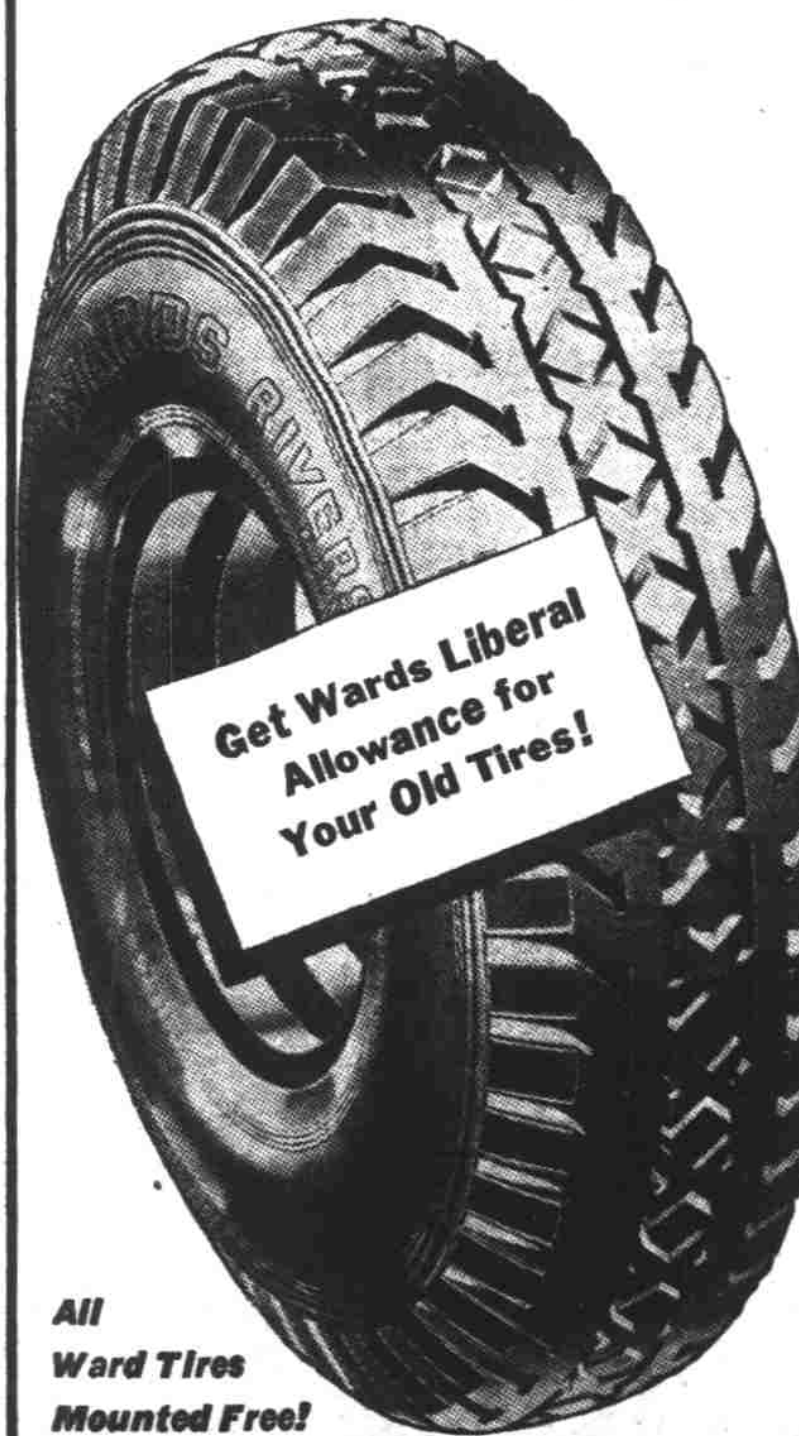
Although an alien to the Colville reservation, Yellow Wolf served as one of the "elder statesmen" and his advice and counsel was sought by other Indians for many years.



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
