FAIR TO SUCCEED WHITE PROMISES

Problems and Encouraging Factors Outlined at Club Session

"The Oregon state fair this year will succeed," Director Solon T. White told the Salem Ad club at its first fall meeting Friday noon at the Quells, despite the fact that two buildings were condemned to start with and the fair fund owed \$186 more than was on hand.

The administration building will be missed he stated, as it was a ponded and torn down, while the agriculture building has been made safe by installation of new timbers.

In Yamhill county the newspapers are printing coupons, Mr. White said, with a "Let's go to the Oregon State Fair" slogan and people in that county have reserved a block of 400 seats in the grandstand for Thursday, September 6, and are bringing their band with them.

He said that in Corvallis he understood the papers would do the same thing today and that the people there had asked for 600 seats.

People from California have commented particularly on the beauty of the fairgrounds this year, and suggested that if it was located in California a lagoon or lake would be built for the center of the grounds and the place used as a park and playground.

White declared that the legislature should make a continuing appropriation for the fair and for the upkeep and repair of the buildings on the fairgrounds. He also stated that the fair should be under a separate manager named by the legislature or if left in the department of agriculture, "where the department would be very happy to have it left," anyway have the appropriation "should" be made by the legislature.

More Work Needed—White said more had to be done to the buildings than to put paint over the rotten wood and say "I'll make a big show." He declared that the fair should have \$25,000 for repair of buildings from the legislature.

The director thanked the people of Salem and the civic clubs and chamber of commerce for their support of the fair and declared "There was no mistake made in the appointment of Leo Spitzbart as assistant director. He is going to succeed."

In suggesting advertising ideas for next year's fair, White pointed to the advertising received for the national Legion convention held in Portland when tire covers were sold, stickers sold to hotels and the luggage, men's suits in Oregon products were placed in restaurants throughout the state and on trains, and stamps to be placed on all letters mailed, and suggested something similar could be worked out this next year for the fair.

Assistant Director Leo G. Spitzbart recalled the fair 35 years ago when as a boy he attended the fair and declared it was a gloomy day for the children when the wire fence was built around the grounds.

He said the cooperation given the administration in this year's fair had been the greatest aid to its assured success. "I found no opposition. Constructive suggestions were given freely. Everyone is enthusiastic and it will be the biggest fair ever held," he said.

Improvements Made—He spoke of the beauty of the grounds, including the mosaic flower bed with over 85,000 plants in it, planted by Ernest Lufer, assisted by Mr. Parker of the state hospital. "There isn't room on the grounds to squeeze a cigarette paper in edgewise," he said. He spoke of the space given to the sunken floral garden in the Agriculture building, the fact that an "ideal pari mutuel plant," double in size that of last year, had been installed and two doors cut through to the paddock, and said pari mutuel machines, operated by electricity, had been installed for betting.

He spoke of the more than 200 stall reservations for race horses from Canada to Mexico, told of the livestock coming from points as far east as the Mississippi, of the Gilmore Circus Parade next Saturday and fireworks that night, and the fact that all children under 16 get in free the opening day, and of the "Spectacular Extravaganza."

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'SCHOOL'S' CLAIMS FOUND MISLEADING

Two solicitors for a correspondence course relating to civil service examinations have been reported to Mary L. Fulkerson, county school superintendent, allegedly to be misrepresenting facts in that they have been telling prospective students civil service positions would be filled at the Salem Indian school from among those passing federal examinations in October. Mrs. Fulkerson yesterday warned all persons interviewed by salesmen of civil service preparation courses to investigate their propositions thoroughly before signing up.

One person approached by the agents, who asked \$29 for their course, contacted Portland federal and Indian school officials and was advised these two men had no official standing. Their claim that their scheme had the approval of C. A. Howard, state superintendent of public instruction, was denied at his office. A local accredited correspondence school agency reported it had no connection with the solicitors in question.

Speedier Patrol Service Provided For South Salem

South Salem residents, whose night police service has been impaired for the last year because of the worn-out condition of Officer Walter Kestly's city-owned automobile, now have speedier service available through purchase of a new car by the city. Kestly has been given the coupe formerly used by Chief Frank A. Minto. This car, driven only 10,000 miles, has been thoroughly overhauled.

Chief Minto yesterday indicated two more cars to replace others that have run over 100,000 miles, would be made this fall if the police department appropriation request included in the 1936 budget now under question. The north Salem patrol car and the big, brown traffic coupe are due for replacement in this event.

RATIONAL METHOD GAINING CONVERTS

Half a dozen more Marion county rural schools will open this fall under the rational, individualized teaching method, Mary L. Fulkerson, county superintendent, reported yesterday following the final conference at her office of teachers preparing to give this type of instruction. There were 21 such schools last year.

Growth of popularity of the rational system, sponsored in this county for the first time by Mrs. Fulkerson four years ago, is evidenced by the contrast of the present number of schools using this plan to the original, four. The rational system, doing away with rigid grade separations, gives the instructor greater freedom in teaching and encourages the child to study independently, better preparing him for work in high school, Mrs. Fulkerson believes.

Justice Job Is Taken Over by City Recorder

The role of justice of the peace was actively assumed yesterday by Municipal Judge A. Warren Jones for the first time since he became the city's recorder and judge. Ex-officio he is empowered to serve as justice of the peace and has been doing so during the absence this week of Judge Miller B. Hayden.

Charles Maden, arrested by state police at Independence on Thursday, was brought before Judge Jones yesterday on a complaint, issued from his court, charging Maden with larceny of automobile tools from Don Burr. Maden asked 24 hours in which to decide on his plea and, unable to furnish \$50 bail, went to the county jail.

Parking Through Night Is Checked
