

GREATEST FAIR EVER 1935 AIM

Low Prices, Wider Variety of Features, Record in Exhibits Promised

Oregon. Horses, too, will again take a prominent part in the entries at the fair.

Free acts are really worth seeing. Next Saturday the Gilmore circus parade of a score of giant rubber inflated animals, with clowns with heads six feet in diameter, over-sized nursery toys, grotesque figures which might well be from the planet Mars, and over 50 clowns, will lead off the list of free attractions on the grounds. That day all children under 16 years will be admitted to the grounds free. That night a fire fireworks display will be given in front of the grandstand.

Sunday a free show, "Spectacular Extravaganza," with a cast of 41 persons, including a famous orchestra with singing ensemble, opera guild players, feature dancers, blues singers, comic and grand opera singers, and scenes from foreign countries will be presented in front of the grandstand.

In addition, every day of the fair free aerial, tightwire, dog and pony show, and other short acts will be presented.

Displays Will Rival All Previous Years

Displays of every kind will rival all previous years. So great is the demand for space that the individual farm products show had to be moved to the porch of the Agriculture building to make room for all county displays.

There will be a beautiful sunken flower garden display by the Florists association. Then there will be the entirely new art department displays, the rearranged and revised textile and home making displays, the auto show in the grandstand and on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday the Kennel club's dog show. Any dog may be entered in the show upon payment of the entry fee, whether or not the dog is registered with the American Kennel club.

To tell of the horse races a whole book is needed. Stalls will be all reserved before the fair ever opens and temporary stalls will have to be built to house many of the horses. Already 144 reservations for stalls have been received from Longacres track near Seattle. 77 reservations have been received from other points in Washington, Oregon and California. Dr. W. H. Lytle, race superintendent, states:

A. R. Galbraith, Washington racing commissioner, will be presiding judge of the meet. Harry Woods will be the starter and William Luke will again be the secretary of the meet and make up the over-night entries. Pari-mutuel betting booth space has been doubled and Hancock totals will be installed. There are 32 windows in the set-up which Robert Murray in charge of the pari-mutuel system states is "ideal."

Brahmas and Texas Longhorns Arrive

Last week 32 head of Brahmas and Texas Longhorn steers arrived for the steer wrestling (bull-dogging) and steer riding events in the rodeo; 40 head of wild horses are on their way here for the bronco and bucking horse events, and in addition there will be the calf roping contest in the rodeo under the direction of Jack Millerick of Millerick and Cowan, well known rodeo managers.

Some of the classiest fancy jumping horses in the northwest will appear in the horse show jumping events, and the spectacular six-horse team heavy draft events are expected to furnish much excitement, too. It is also possible that the three- and five-gaited horses will be shown in the horse show. The horse show which precedes the night rodeo will be held every evening starting on labor day, Monday, in the stadium.

On the midway are new rides, attractions and games and offerings in food and novelties. Not a foot of space remains to be sold. The beauty of the grounds, flower beds and lawns has been commented on many times by visitors already. A mosaic, near the main entrance, is made up of over 85,000 plants. It was designed and planted by Ernest Mr. Parker of the state hospital staff. Entries have been coming in daily for the various departments, long before the usual time and before the superintendents of the departments are on duty to receive the displays. All entries and exhibitors will be ready to be shown by next Saturday morning at 9 a. m.

Fair Office Moves To New Location

The fair office, formerly in the administration building at the main entrance, which had been torn down after being condemned as unsafe for use, has been moved to what was formerly the ladies' cottage. The ladies' rest room has been moved two doors east, toward the stadium.

Salem's police and fire departments will be in charge of their respective work at the grounds during the fair.

Special trains will come from Portland daily, leaving the Rose City at 9:30 a. m., and will return, leaving Salem at 5:30 p. m. daily. The round trip fare is only \$1 for adults and 50 cents for children. Special bus schedules have been added to aid those wishing to come to the fair.

Tamhill county, Benton county, Lane county and others are planning special caravans of cars and special trains to the fair.

While convinced that the state cannot afford to be penurious in providing land for the new state house, Governor Martin and the other members of the state board of control are taking pains not to outrun their interference—not to summon the legislature until public sentiment has time to form on the new site matter and assured support in the legislature is seen. City, State, Federal Joint Purchase Seen

Were it not for PWA's insistent demands for action on the capitol project, the special legislative session would not be held until December 1. As things stand the session will be convened only if made action on the state house matter imperative. The talk going the statehouse rounds now call for a three-way program of site acquisition—that is, the federal government, the state and the City of Salem, cooperating to provide the necessary funds.

Senator Charles L. McNary is due home late this week and he has had opportunity to see his wife, his baby, and the trout on the McNary farm and to inspect the filbert trees, he will devote much of his energy to getting the details closed up with Washington on the statehouse matter. President Roosevelt has renewed his proffer of help and PWA administrators only criticism is the comparatively small amount the state proposes to spend for its 100-year headquarters.

Probe of Kellaher Activities Continues

The Dan Kellaher investigation continues, pending the belated return of Judge L. H. McMahon from eastern Oregon and his summing up of a Marion county grand jury. Ed Duffy, state parole officer, heads the checkup crew and from sources deemed reliable Duffy is uncovering a mass of new material to throw light on the handling of pardons through Mr. Kellaher's office for the four years he served the Meier administration. Peter Zimmerman, who was to show up the day Kellaher made his plea for a L. A. Hanks' release from prison, has maintained a discreet silence; the Kellaher revelations for the moment stopped his expected forensics for the ex-Medford editor.

Rufus C. Holman has already told his intimates at the statehouse that his hat is in the ring for the treasurer'ship in 1936 and as evidence Mr. Holman is missing no county fairs or summer picnics for which he is invited. Without cavil, Mr. Holman's continued harmonious relations with Governor Martin on the board of control have won him friends and his political stock is rising. The Meier-Holman fights and feuds lashed the public and lost the support of many voters who sought the republican nomination for governor last year. If he continues his present policy of an "area of good feeling" on the board of control, he will be formidable in the treasurer'ship race a year from now.

Education Affairs Have Brighter Hue

Arrival of newly elected Chancellor Hunter from Denver is awaited eagerly by all persons associated with higher education. Hunter's arrival means the dissolution of Dr. Kerr from the power he has held through nearly three decades. Hunter is expected to heal wounds, and to straighten out maladjustments produced by the interneine warfare of the last four years in higher education.

While the board of higher education is recorded as unanimous on the Kerr pension resolution, objection made to that much-criticized expenditure of public funds is based on the official minutes of the board and it is doubtful if the retirement pay for Kerr will be changed this year.

Gravel Truck Lands in Ditch, Holmes Gap

Solons Have Slight Hope Of Any Rest

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Sober realization of the bitter-end political campaign ahead tempered adoration enthusiasm in congressional circles.

Superficially the word-worn legislators talked of rest. Underneath for many ran doubts that "back home" would be so restful, considering the surge of dispute over happenings here since January.

A year hence, it was remembered, the entire house of representatives and a third of the senate will be up for reelection along with the Roosevelt-Garner ticket.

Instead of a respite, the legislative intermission was expected to transfer to the country-at-large the capital conflicts about the new deal. The president was known to be planning greater aggressiveness.

Republicans as well as democrats looked upon the session's windup as a warrant for intensified national activity. John Hamilton, counsel for the G. O. P. national committee, beat Mr. Roosevelt to the air by a few hours to decry "the egotistical ambitions of an uncontrolled ruler and his satellites."

for Pope (D. Ida.), for a statement he made in England predicting the United States might become involved in another world war.

Although discarding 47 to 28 a resolution by Senator La Follette (Prog., Wis.), serving notice that the senate had not authorized any of its members to represent it abroad "directly or indirectly," senators made it plain that such statements as that of Pope were "unfortunate" but carried no official weight.

The neutrality resolution, representing a reversal of traditional American policy in permitting the president wide discretion in conducting international affairs, calls for an outright ban on shipments of arms and munitions to belligerents until February 29, 1936. Two months after the next congress convenes.

er. Mix milk and beaten eggs alternately with combined dry ingredients. After rolling the berries in flour, add them last of all. Bake in moderate oven one-half hour and serve with the following hard sauce:

Stir together one cupful of white sugar and half a cup of butter until it is creamy and light. Flavor to taste with a small amount of huckleberry juice.

Huckleberry Tapioca

2 cups fresh huckleberries.
2 tablespoons tapioca.
1 egg.
2 cups hot water.
1 teaspoon butter.
1 cup sugar.
1 tablespoon lemon juice.

Sweeten huckleberries to taste. Add tapioca and salt to water, and cook double boiler 15 minutes, or until tapioca is clear, stirring frequently. Add butter and sugar. Remove from fire; add berries and lemon juice. Chill until firm. Serve in sherbet glasses. Garnish with whipped cream. Serves six.

Huckleberry Pudding

1 cup shortening.
1 cup sugar.
2 eggs.
1 cup flour.
1/2 teaspoon baking powder.
1/2 cup milk.
1 cup huckleberries.

Cream shortening and sugar together. Add beaten egg and mix well. Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt. Reserve 1/4 cup of flour to mix with berries. Add the remainder alternating with milk to the first mixture. Beat
