Lights Out in South Salem Few Minutes; Damage is Not Reported Here

slightly cooler than yesterday's, the southern part of the state was raked by violent thunderstorms late this afternoon. Deluge strikes near Medford.

The rain was confined principally to the Siskiyou mountain area. An electrical display disrupted power service near Grants Pass and a near-record deluge flooded the Jacksonville-Ruch highway near Medford. The temperature dropped from 93 to 85 degrees at Medford.

Temperatures in northern Oregon continued high, with Portland recording 93 degrees compared to Tuesday's 98, a change in humidity had somewhat lessened danger of fire, however.

Considerable timber and a donkey engine were destroyed by flames near Cochran west of Portland early today.

Forest officials, however, were heartened by the higher humidity and removed entry restrictions from timber lands in four of the ten western Oregon counties closed a few days ago. The Dalles High With 100 Degrees

Temperatures in Oregon were reported today as follows: The Dalles 100, Baker 90, Roseburg 98, Eugene 92. Other points in the Pacific northwest also experienced a hot sun. Boise reporting 93, Roselle 90, Seattle 90, Spokane 85, Walla Walla 96 and Yakima 96.

EUGENE, Aug. 28.—(AP)—With the maximum dropping to 92 from Tuesday's 97 degrees, Eugene experienced slightly cooler weather Wednesday. A breeze also aided in lessening the heat wave.

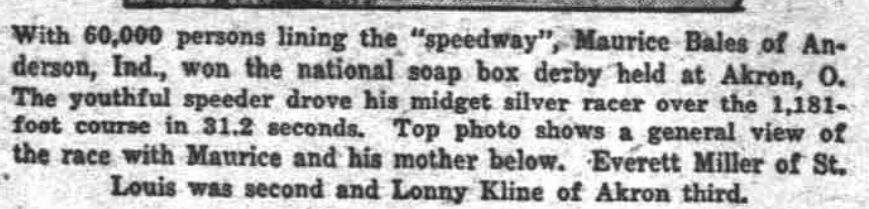

man" also received the executive's approval, while he said he would sign the Guffey coal and neutrality legislation before the week is out. He disclosed, however, that some of the bills awaiting his scrutiny will be vetoed.

No Action Taken on Russia Protest Reply

Mr. Roosevelt discussed with Secretary Hall soviet Russia's rejection of this nation's protest against communistic activities, but no immediate action was forthcoming.

Elsewhere in the capital: New deal political leaders were counting on the election-year pull of party regularity to offset moves for an independent democratic ticket in 1936. Senator Glass (D-Va.) had half an hour's chat with the president.

Congressional experts disclosed that the tax bill contains a provision lifting the capital gains levy in cases where a holding company desires to liquidate a subsidiary.

The administration turned to a \$10,000,000 work relief fund for censuses that will provide statistical information helping to lay the groundwork for old age pensions and unemployment insurance.

James A. Moffett's resignation as federal housing administrator was accepted by President Roosevelt. Stewart McDonald, assistant administrator, was reported in line for the job.

S. district attorney for Oregon, who was a fellow student, at the supreme court building yesterday. Neuner had been talking about "sentiment" in connection with the Willamette campus, when he said:
