

SOLONS RIGHT TO OFFICE SUIT IDEA

That a suit to determine whether the opinion of Attorney General Van Winkle, holding that certain members of the state legislature were ineligible to serve, is valid was rumored about the state offices yesterday.

Van Winkle held that five members of the 1935 legislature had forfeited their rights to serve because they have accepted other state and federal offices or jobs.

These included Senators Ashby, Dickson, Multnomah county, and Walter Fisher of Douglas, and Representatives Henry Semon, Klamath; John E. Cooter, Lincoln; William Johnson, Jr., and Lew Wallace, both of Portland. Cooter was speaker of the house at the 1935 legislative session.

Since the opinion was written William Knight, representative from Douglas county, has accepted the office of assistant district attorney.

The nature of the proposed suit was not divulged.

Bridal Veil Man Paid for 4 Cows Creosote Killed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Fred Luscher of Bridal Veil, Ore., who claimed the loss of seven cows which licked creosote from transmission poles installed by the commerce department, has been partly reimbursed for such loss by congress enactment.

Secretary Roper noted at his press conference today that a bill provided for the payment of \$221.50 for four cows, since investigation disclosed "there was some doubt as to the cause of the death of three of them, valued at \$55."

Ten Known Dead, Nine Missing in Nippon Typhoon

TOKYO, Aug. 29.—(Thursday)—(AP)—Ten persons were known dead and nine missing at Kobe today as a typhoon, having swept over Kyushu and Shikoku islands off southern Japan, struck the industrial heart of the empire. The storm spread over a large area on the main island, from Hitohimal to Tokyo.

The rains partly inundated 14,000 houses at Osaka, a seaport on the southern part of the main island, and 9,000 houses at Kobe, police estimated.
