

## FIRST STATES CUT OFF FEDERAL DOLE

Alabama and Wyoming Will Get No Further Direct Relief is Ruling

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Complete abandonment of "this business of relief" in Alabama and Wyoming after next Monday was ordered today by Harry L. Hopkins.

The move toward the goal of providing 3,500,000 work relief jobs by November, and disbanding the relief administration, coincided with storm signals from Secretary Ickes' public works program.

High cost of PWA projects per man employed, and shortage of skilled construction workers on relief rolls, today brought Hopkins' rejection of 285 projects approved by Ickes. The PWA administrator, whose chagrin was obvious, telegraphed states and communities in the hope their applications can be revised to meet Hopkins' objections before the final meeting of the world relief allotment committee on September 17.

Paving the way for Hopkins' action in cutting the first states off the dole—with similar action predicted for eight more later in the month—the allotments committee this week recommended allotment of only \$75,000,000 for September direct relief. This contrasted with \$22,000,000 for this month. Only 200,000 besides Civilian Conservation Corps members now are employed on work relief jobs.

Approved work relief projects in Alabama involve \$35,170,730, and in Wyoming, \$18,951,471. Hopkins said "additional projects will be submitted from time to time by both states to provide jobs for the necessary volume of Works Program workers."

## KLAMATH RAILWAY SERVICE RESUMED

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Railway traffic to Klamath Falls, disrupted last night by a glacier slide and floods at Mt. Shasta in northern California, was expected to be restored tonight.

Southern Pacific railway officials announced that the recent warm weather, combined with a cloudburst, loosened a large section of glacier on the north side of Mt. Shasta. The slide deposited an estimated 5,000,000 cubic yards of ice, snow and debris in a canyon far down the mountain and caused water to back up, flooding a large area and washing out 200 feet of track.

Earlier reports here indicated 1500 feet of track was washed out. The disruption occurred 75 miles south of here.

While this is the main Southern Pacific line between San Francisco and Portland, the old line through Ashland and over the Siskiyou remains in regular use and the trains were sent over that route.

Scores of visitors to the national convention of the association of Twenty-Three clubs opening here today were delayed.

## Justice Court Has Grist of Cases, Fines

WOODBURN, Aug. 29.—Several cases came up in Justice Overton's court recently. Ernest L. Huber was fined \$5 and costs of \$2.25, after entering plea of guilty to the charge of driving a motor truck on the highway at a speed of 45 miles per hour. John W. Sisco, plead guilty to the charge of passing another vehicle traveling in the same direction without sufficient clearance. He paid a fine of \$5 and costs.

David Morehouse, for driving his truck at night without side or rear lights, plead guilty and paid a fine of \$10 plus costs.

Frank Addison, arrested on complaint filed by Fred Hecker, for being intoxicated in a public place, entered a plea of guilty and paid a fine of \$10 plus \$5.20 costs.

## 953 Arrests on Traffic Charges Noted for July

State troopers participated in 953 arrests for traffic law violations during the month of July, with fines aggregating \$7113.01, Charles P. Pray, superintendent of state police, reported Thursday.

Approximately 350 arrests re-

sulted from the failure of automobile owners to obtain operators' permits within the statutory license period.

There were 223 arrests in the general law enforcement division and 62 arrests for violation of the fish and game codes.

The state police investigated 399 complaints of which 97 were reported as cleared.

Fifteen persons arrested during the month were held for other law enforcement agencies.

## FARM BANKRUPTCY ACT BECOMES LAW

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today wrote into law the farm bankruptcy measure and the two railroad pension bills which provide for workers' retirement and the money to finance it.

The bills replace the rail pension and the Frasier-Lemke farm debt bills which were held unconstitutional by the supreme court.

The chief executive signed the rail measures in the presence of Representative Cresser (D-Ohio) author of the bills, and Timothy Shea, chairman of the legislative committee of the Railway Labor Executive association. They were given the pens used.

Laws Are Twins  
The two laws were passed by the 73rd congress at about the

same time and signed by the president on the same day. Both were declared unconstitutional by the supreme court in the same month, and again today were made law together in somewhat different form.

The bankruptcy measure would stay foreclosure proceedings against a farmer for three years, if he turns the custody of his property over to the courts and meanwhile pays "a reasonable rental."

## Reserve Banks' Holdings Show Further Gains

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—(AP)—The federal reserve board report-

ed today that member bank reserves balances increased \$55,000,000 during the week ended August 28, bringing excess reserves to a new high level of \$2,780,000,000.

Member bank reserve balances now total \$5,346,000,000, an amount \$1,219,000,000 in excess of the figure at this time last year.

Gold stocks rose \$8,000,000 during the week to total \$9,187,000,000, which was \$1,216,000,000 more than last year.

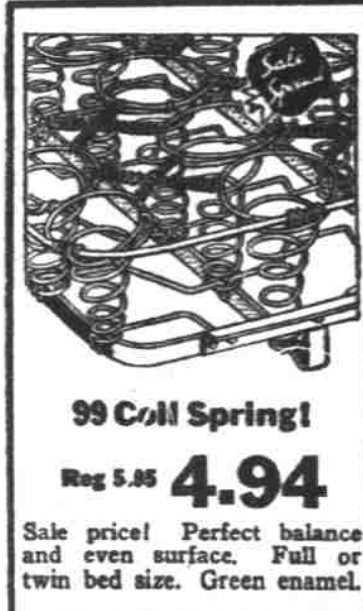

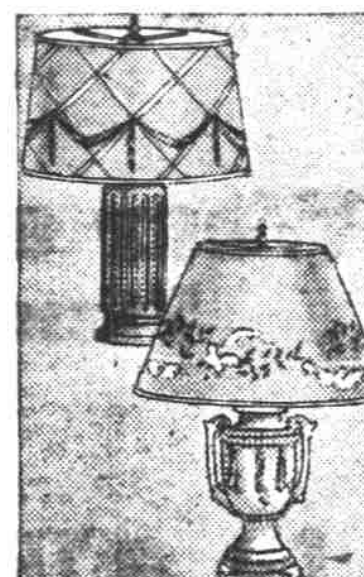
