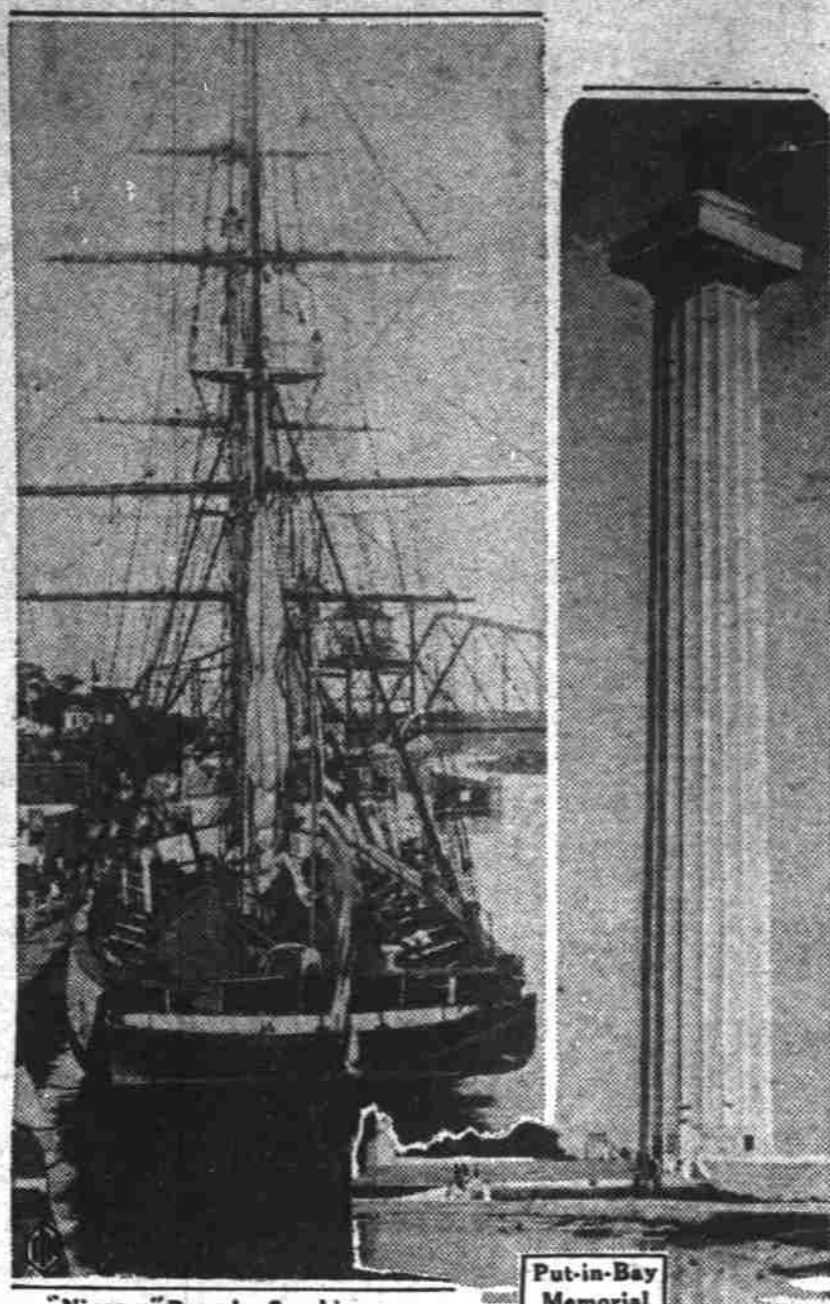
Lease Miller Ranch

Battle of Lake Erie Recalled



"Niagara-Hull's Flagship" Put-in-Bay Memorial

Cleveland and the federal government on Sept. 10 plan to honor Oliver Hazard Perry, long-dead naval officer, on the 122nd anniversary of the Battle of Lake Erie. It will be the first time the federal government and the city administration has joined in observance of the occasion. Three bombing planes of the U. S. army will circle over Perry's monument at Cleveland's Gordon park where a number of events are planned in homage to Perry, whose dispatch after the victory over the British, was "We have met the enemy and they are ours. Two ships, two brigs, one schooner and one sloop." This has gone down in history as one of the most famous of all historical memorials.

ERNTSONS INJURED IN HIT-RUN CRASH

AURORA, Sept. 9.—Mr. and Mrs. Peter Erntson, living in the Hollywood area of Salem, were badly hurt Sunday night about 8:30 o'clock when returning from Woodburn to Salem, when Erntson's car was sideswiped by an unknown driver near the Chemawa Four Corners. Mrs. Erntson had two breaks in her left leg and he has a possible skull fracture. They were rushed to a Salem hospital, though due to telephone lines being out, it was an hour before the police and ambulance arrived. The accident happened when a third car, a Chevrolet going north, attempted to pass at the same time Erntson was meeting another car. The Erntsons were given first aid, a Portland doctor and a trained nurse being in cars which followed the Erntson car.

The hit and run driver is reported to have turned around with a block of the accident and hurried back toward Salem at great speed. The car was followed but no one could get close enough to get the number.
